



A NEW PLAN.

WASHINGTON, May 28.

Thad. Stevens introduced a bill declaring that the States lately in rebellion have forfeit-ed their rights under the Constitution, and can be reinstated in the same only through the ac-tion of Congress, which provides that they may form valid governments, the present ones be-ing continued until they shall be duly altered, and their executives and legislatures reorgan-ized. Constitutions are to be formed and submitted to the people, a majority of whom is necessary for their ratification. All male per-sons above twenty-one years of age are to be allowed to vote. No constitution is to be pre-sented for congressional sanction which denies civil rights to any person. The bill was com-mitted to the Committee of the Whole on the State of the Union.

CHOLERA CASES.

NEW YORK, June 1.

The cholers at quarantine is said to be of a very malignant type, and is principally con-fined to the German passengers. S4 cases have been admitted on board the hospital ship Fal-con, out of which number 14 have died, leav-ing 70 patients, at last accounts, under treat-ment ment.
