But the consolation is, that it is not lost or destroyed; for it still shines, though unseen by mortal eyes, in undimmed and increased splendor—unobstructed by the frailties of the fiesh, and untarnished by contact with a sinful world.

Her natural endowments were of a high and noble order. From very childhood she was ever distinguished by a leading mind, which did not fail to attract attention, to command respect, and elicit admiration. Her comprehen-sive grasp of every subject within her accus-tomed range of thought—a rapid and judicious analysis or combination of all the important elements involved in any question of practical morality, of prudence, of utility, or of taste, rendered her a valuable counsellor and desira-ble friend. Such was the confidence inspired by a knowledge of her talents in these respects, that her epinions often exercised a controlling influence in directions where, in becoming influence in directions where, in becoming modesty, she would not have presumed to offer formal advice. Conscious that her views and opinions, when matured, were not mere whims, opinions, when matured, were not mere whims, but the result of a legitimate process of reason-ing, she was conspicuous for decision and firm-ness; while a constitutional ardor and energy imparted to her character such a motive power as rendered her eminently active and efficient in every sphere of life. The unostentations in every sphere of life. The unostentatious elegance, the frugal comfort, and the excellent isste, displayed in her much-loved home, attracted the eye of the visiting stranger; while her intellectual elevation, conversational attractions, graceful deportment, and winning atten-tions to all those amenities becoming to her position as mistress of the household, usually made an impression remembered, and often referred to, with expressions of pleasure, and in terms of praise.

When about thirteen years of age, in compa-

ny with her father and brother, she joined the Baptist Church; but ten or eleven years ago she united with the Methodist—in which com-munion she remained until death. She always cherished a lively and abiding interest in the prosperity of the church-its ministry and membership—the progress of its doctrines, and the advancement of its various enterprises for the promotion of the moral and spiritual im-provement of the world. Her feeble health de-barred her, much of the time, from what she ever esteemed a privilege and pleasure—the exercise of her superior gifts and acquirements in the Sunday School room. Among the many things, pleasant to remember, which she said in her last days, was an expression of the happiness it would afford her, should God be pleased to restore her health, to "take the dear little shildren as by the hand, and lead them to Jesus." The trying times of the last several years fur-

nished many exemplifications of her patriotism, fortitude, sympathy and charity.

Her death-bed utterances were of a very satisfactory and comforting nature. Wholly absorbed in spiritual exercises—unreservedly reliant on the merits of Jesus Christ—full of love to God and every human being—she often spoke with an exulting degree of assurance, of the bliesful, glorious future.

Her mind was clear and bright until the sun
