

BY THE LAST MAIL
WAR IN EUROPE.
New York, June 16.
The City of Paris bringing Liverpool dates of the 5th via Queenstown, of the 6th has arrived.
The conference has been abandoned, in consequence of the demands of Austria, which rendered the mediation of the neutral powers an impossibility. The neutrals have broken off all negotiations, and it remains for the belligerents to negotiate among themselves, or inaugurate war. It is believed that hostilities will commence in the Elbe Duchies, and that Austria's great move will be to seize Silesia. Prussia will probably commence the war, and has already sent circulars to the neutral powers, charging Austria with a flagrant breach of treaties.
The Prussian army comprises 452 battalions of infantry, 820 squadrons of cavalry, and 1,000 field pieces of artillery. The Italian volunteers number 96,000. The Austrian army now numbers 900,000, and it is supposed 200,000 will operate against Prussia, and 200,000 against Italy, exclusive of reserves. It is reported that if Prussia seizes Holstein, the Austrians will cross the frontier. Spain's forces have been augmented to 85,000.
The London Times declares that all hopes of peace have vanished.
June 17.—The steamers Hausa and South Hampton, with Liverpool dates of the 5th, have arrived. It is confirmed that France has officially notified England and Prussia that negotiations for peace have failed. Napoleon said "Austria will take upon herself a grave responsibility."
June 18.—By the arrival of the Peruvian at Farther Point, we have Liverpool dates of the 8th.
Prussian troops entered Holstein on the 7th. The Austrians were concentrating at Altona where a collision is expected. These movements are regarded as a virtual commencement of the war.

FINANCIAL.
New York, June 17.
The imports of the past week exceed seven millions dollars of which there was four millions of sugar, tea and coffee. The excitement in the Gold Room has been intense for several days past. Four or five of the heaviest stock speculators have lost fortunes in that time by throwing their money and influence against the rise.
A London letter to a banking firm here says the specie arrivals are an immense thing for American credit. The amount sent from America is everywhere admitted to have saved general bankruptcy in England. The letters to other banking houses in this city are very much to the same effect.
HALIFAX, June 18.—By the arrival of the China to day, we learn that the Continental news continue warlike.
DETROIT, June 18.—General Cass died yesterday morning, aged 84.
NEW YORK, June 18.—Three deaths occurred from cholera yesterday, and there is much alarm in anticipation of the spreading of the disease.
BALTIMORE, June 18.—A man died from cholera yesterday afternoon, who arrived on Saturday afternoon from New York.
NEW YORK, June 16.—Four steamers sailed to day for Europe, and took out \$2,087,000 in gold.
NEW YORK, June 16.—Roberts, the Fenian President, was discharged from custody yesterday United States District Attorney Courtney, for the present, has withdrawn the prosecution.

PHILADELPHIA, June 14.
Anticipating the adoption of the Constitutional amendment passed by the United States Senate and just concurred in by the House, Governor Curtin of Pennsylvania addressed a Circular to the Governor of the Northern States, suggesting the propriety of union in action and the calling together of the Legislatures for the immediate ratification of the amendment, and before the adjournment of Congress.
The Star asserts that the votes of the more Conservative Union men were obtained for Constitutional amendments by a pledge from their Radical colleagues that no action shall be taken during the present session upon the bills, also reported from the Joint Committee, on reconstruction. This virtually refers the whole matter to the people.
There was considerable excitement on the steps in front of the capitol to-day. Roseau, who had a rattan, approached Grinnell, and said he had waited several days for him to apologize for the outrageous assault made on him in debate. Grinnell said, I have no apology to make. Roseau, thereupon calmed him, Grinnell making no resistance whatever.—When Roseau had finished the flagellation, Grinnell merely said, "it is all right," and the parties separated.

WASHINGTON, June 15.
The Senate Finance Committee have fixed the tax on cotton at two cents per pound—probably the two Houses will compromise on three cents. The general principles of the House Bill have not been altered.
In the House a committee was appointed to investigate the facts of Roseau's assault on Grinnell and to report the same with resolutions looking to the vindication of the dignity of the House and protection of the members.
In the House Mr. Bingham submitted concurring resolutions requesting the President to inform forthwith the Governors of the States of the passage by Congress of the proposed constitutional amendment, so that the Legislatures may act on it at once. It was objected to. Remarks followed, which led to a decision by the Speaker that Joint resolutions did not have to be submitted to the President for his signature. After some debate on the special order, the bill for restoring the Southern States to political privileges, the House adjourned.
The trial of paymaster Paulding was concluded to day. It was shown he disbursed over a hundred and forty millions dollars in the Department of Washington, and large sums in the South. Nothing was ever alleged against his official acts until his deposits of large sums with the Merchants National Bank just before the failure thereof, when he was arraigned for violation of orders. None of the evidence showed corrupt motives. The findings of the court martial was sent to the President.
The Republicans of New Hampshire have nominated James W. Patterson, the present Congressman, for United States Senator.

WASHINGTON, June 14.
A San Francisco dispatch says the result of the Oregon election is doubtful. Both parties claim the State by about 600 majority. The returns of election from Washington Territory show large Democratic gains. The entire Democratic ticket was successful in nine counties and is reported to be same in four more.
