GREAT BATTLES—14,000 PRISONERS CAPTURED.

NEW YORK, July 15. The Prussians carried Getschin by storm, after an obstinate defence, and a junction was effected between the army of the Elbe, under Prince Frederick Charles, and the army of Silesia, under the crown Prince. Five thousand prisoners were captured at Getschin. The losses by the Austrians, in the series of combats, is altogether estimated at 20,000 killed and wounded, and 15,000 prisoners. In the battles on the 28th and 29th ultimo, the corps of Austrians, under General Gublinz, was nearly broken up; it lost 24 guns and 8 flags. The Prussians have retired to a strong position between Josephstadt and Koningratz, their retreat is said to have been precipitate. The army of the Elbe advanced beyond Getschin. The King of Prussia was at Getschin on the 24, on a visit to the army.

The London Times says, horrible as the carnage has been, it is a mere prelude to the pitched battle now unavoidable, in which a quarter of a million men will be engaged on either side. King Victor Emanuel sent a telegram congratulating the King of Prussia on the victories of his army. The operations between the Italians and Austrians is confined to skirmishing. No engagement of importance occurred in that quarter. The Italians are preparing for another onslaught, and the soldiers eager for the fray.

FARTHER POINT, July 15. The steamer Nova Scotian, from Liverpool, with dates to the 5th, has passed here. A great battle occurred on the 3d, near Ludaway, in which the Prussians gained a complete victory, capturing 14,000 Austrians. There were terrible losses in both armies. The Austrians sent in a flag of truce. Austria has agreed to a cession of Venetia and accepted Napoleon as her mediator. Napoleon immediately communicated with the belligerents.

LONDON, July 6. The Prussian and Italian reply to the proposed armistice has not yet expired. There are rumors that the Prussian reply is not favorable. The Morning Post thinks a European Congress will shortly assemble, and that the French Government will propose a general disarmament. In the Commercial circle of London peace is regarded as virtually concluded. The Paris Moniteur of July 5th, says after having maintained the honor of his arms in Italy, the Emperor of Austria, concurring in ideas expressed in Napoleon's letter of June 11th, to his Minister of foreign affairs, cedes Venetia to the French Emperor, and accepts his mediation for the conclusion of peace. Napoleon hastened to respond to the summons and immediately communicated with the Kings of Prussia and Italy, in order to obtain an armistice.

The Battle of Sultowa lasted twelve hours. The Austrians were completely routed, losing fourteen thousand prisoners, one hundred and sixteen cannon. Three Arch Dukes were wounded; Prince Lichsteinstein and Undischer are prisoners.

The London Times says the war is virtually ended. Garibaldi attacked the Austrians at Manza Scullo on the 3d and was repulsed. Garibaldi was wounded in the thigh.

LIVERPOOL, July 30. Cotton quiet and unchanged. Sales 10,000 bales. Breadstuffs quiet and steady; provisions have a declining tendency; wheat nominal with downward tendency.

The Hanoverian army surrendered to the Prussians, and were allowed to return to their homes. A desperate battle was fought in Bohemia, near Nachod and Traulenan. Conflicting accounts received. A Berlin dispatch claims that the Prussians drove the Austrians on the 27th and 28th, capturing 8,000 prisoners; while the Vienna telegram claims the Austrians captured 18 guns and many prisoners. In the fight of Traulenan the Austrians are said to have lost from 4,000 to 5,000 killed and wounded. The Prussians lost 1,000. There was great rejoicing at Berlin over the alleged Prussian victory, and the people presented an address to the King. Vienna despatches, on the other hand, assert that Major General Benedek prevented the junction of the army of Prince Frederick Charles with the army of Silesia, and was successful in the engagement of the 27th and 28th, killing and wounding a great number of the enemy. The London Times says it is difficult to decide the result, as the action was not decisive. Indefinite reports are received from the Italian army, which has changed its plan of operations.

Derby has been forced to form his Cabinet exclusively Tory. Trouble is threatened among the London populace about the reform question.

According to the Prussian reports they defeated the Austrians at Nachod on the 27th, and at Traulenan on the 28th, and Munchingratz in that vicinity, on the same day. On the other hand, the last Austrian telegram gives the following report: "Iardubitz, June 27th. The Prussians were completely defeated by the Austrians yesterday, under Gublentz, leaving behind one third of their army, killed and wounded. They withdrew to Prussian territory, towards Glatz. The Austrian cavalry under Gen. Ebelheim drove the Prussians out of Jacin to Teruan, and compelled them to evacuate Molinik and Liepa and retreated. Prussian loss enormous. The Prussians here engaged were of the army of the Elbe. The Prussians on the Silesian frontiers were commanded by Crown Prince Frederick William. The Federal army is on the point of marching from Frankfurt, and a battle is anticipated.

A Cracow Austrian despatch says the Prussians attacked Osvynten June 28th, and were repulsed with heavy loss. The Austrians acknowledge the Prussians have destroyed their Railroads, and seriously interrupted communication with different points.

WASHINGTON July 12. It is rumored that Speed, Attorney General has tendered his resignation, and that Harlan will do the same.

Grant has issued an order directing all Departments and District and Post Commanders in the States lately in rebellion to arrest all persons who have been or may hereafter be charged with the commission of crimes and offences against officers, agents, citizens and inhabitants of the United States, irrespective of color. In cases where the civil authorities have failed or neglected or are unable to arrest and bring such parties to trial, and to detain them in military confinement until such time as a proper judicial tribunal may be ready and willing to try them.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—The President returned the Freedman's Bureau bill to the House of Representatives without his signature. He says the legislation which it proposes is not consistent with the welfare of the country and that it falls clearly within the reasons assigned in his veto message of a similar measure in February. He refers to that document for his objections.

The National Union Convention

We extract the following from the address of forty Democratic Senators and Representatives of Congress.

"TO THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES:"—"Dangers threaten the Constitution. The citadel of our liberties is directly assailed. The future is dark unless the people come to the rescue(*) as essential to the National Union, we must maintain unimpaired the rights, the dignity and equality of the States, including the right of representation in Congress, and the exclusive right of each State to control its own domestic concerns, subject only to the Constitution of the United States (**.) At present, eleven States are excluded from the National Councils. For seven long months the present Congress has persistently denied the right of representation to the people of those States.(*) This denial of representation has been made to all the members from a State, although the State presents itself (*) in the persons of representatives whose loyalty cannot be questioned under any existing Constitutional or legal test. The representatives of nearly one-third of the States have not been consulted with reference to the great questions of the day (**). This state of things should be removed at once and forever. Therefore to preserve the National Union; to vindicate the suffering of an admirable Constitution; to guard the States from a covert (*) attempt to deprive them of their true position in the Union, and to bring together those who are unavoidably separated, and for these great National purposes only, we cordially approve the call for a National Union Convention to be held in the City of Philadelphia, the 14th day of August next.

Signed by forty Democratic members of the United States Congress.
