THE ATLANTIC CABLE LAID.

PEACE BETWEEN PRUSSIA AND AUSTRIA.

NEW YORK, July 29.—The Atlantic Cable is a complete success. The following has just been received.

HEART'S CONTENT, July 28, P. M.—We arrived here at nine o'clock this morning all well. Thank God the cable has been laid and is in perfect working order.

HEART'S CONTENT, July 27.—Aspy Bay, July 28.—The London Times of the 27th says of the age: It is a great work—the glory of the age and nations; and they who have achieved it deserve to be honored benefactors of their race.

A treaty of peace has been signed between Austria and Prussia.
A previous telegram says that five days armistice between Austria and Prussia commenced at noon on the 23d, and there was no fighting on the 22d, the Austrians claiming a victory.

LIVERPOOL, July 21.—The announcement that Austria had accepted the proposals for a suspension of hostilities has caused great buoyancy in all the markets. The prevailing opinion especially among Germans being that peace is almost certain to be concluded, and consequently there will be no resumption of hostilities. The Italian answer had not yet been received. There were no reports of further fighting.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—The Senate has confirmed the appointment of O. H. Browning as Secretary of the Interior, in place of Harlan. Both Houses remained in session all night.

Patterson was admitted to a seat in the Senate, this morning, on taking the prescribed oath of office. The House, last night, refused to modify the test oath in his favor.

SAVANNAH, July 28.—Six deaths and nineteen new cases of cholera at Tybee to-day. The number of cases in the hospitals 89. Total number of deaths to date 146.

NEW YORK, July 30.—The deaths last week were about 750, a decrease of over six hundred from the previous week. Nineteen cholera deaths occurred on Saturday and Sunday in New York and Brooklyn.

CINCINNATI, July 28.—Vallandigham and Judge Gilmore were yesterday appointed delegates to the Philadelphia Convention from the third district of this State.

From the Daily South Carolinian.

FROM SAVANNAH.
July 25.—Thirteen deaths occurred from cholera among the soldiers on Tybee Island and twenty eight new cases. One soldier was shot while trying to desert. No cases on San Salvador Island or in the city.
July 26.—Twelve deaths and twenty-two new cases of cholera since yesterday, and this morning sixty-seven in all; entirely among the troops on Tybee Island.

FOREIGN NEWS.
FURTHER POINT, July 26.—The Hibernian passed yesterday with Liverpool advices of the 16th, which reports the cotton market opening that day with a decided improvement in demand. The market was firm but prices not developed. Sales estimated at 8,000 bales. Nothing further has transpired about the peace negotiations between Napoleon and the contending parties.

The Prussians defeated the Federals in a sanguinary conflict at Oeschlaefenburg, and marched towards Frankfurt, which was evacuated by the Federals. The Diet had removed to Augustenburg. The Prussian headquarters were at Brunn, Austria. It is reported that the Prussians have occupied Iglau.

The London Times thinks the Prussians will be before Venice on the 17th, and doubts if the Austrians can withstand the victorious Prussians. Giardini occupied Peduca and Vicenza and the towns on the railroad to Venice. It is declared in diplomatic circles at Strasbourg that Russia has no present intention to change her neutral attitude and will not expect a foreign power shall intervene in the affairs of Germany.

MISCELLANEOUS.

BALTIMORE, July 26.
The great Railroad bridge over the Susquehanna river, at Havre de Grace, was destroyed by a tornado last night. Loss one million of dollars.

The Baltimore National Union State Convention endorses the President and denounces the policy of Congress as fanatical and malignant and destructive of the true interests of the country; also demand a modification of registry law and approve the Philadelphia Convention, to which Gov. Swann, Reverdy Johnson, Montgomery Blair and Christfield are appointed delegates.

Banks' resolution modifying the naturalization laws was passed by a unanimous vote.

PHILADELPHIA, July 26.
The building for the accommodation of the National Convention is being constructed at the corner of Broad and Wallace streets. It will be of monstrous size.

Three cases of cholera reported.
The Governor of Louisiana has issued a proclamation calling the Convention of 1861 and ordering elections to fill vacancies.
