

and he believed that their action would be condemned by the voters of a majority of the people of the Northern States. (Applause.) There was a crisis in the affairs of the country, a time of imminent peril both to the people of the North and the South, and he hoped that the people of the North might, by the 4th of March next, roll up such a vote that the Radicals might be effectually deprived of all share in this Government. He had a great hope that the Radicals would be effectually stopped in their purposes in the great State of Pennsylvania. She had the cognomen of the Keystone State, the keystone of the arch which supported this great Union. Old Pennsylvania stood steadfast by the Union, and when the Federal Government called for soldiers, in the very front, with all alacrity, stood the gallant sons of Pennsylvania. They had preserved what they had fought so well for, but they had now a duty to perform—they had to preserve the Constitution of our fathers. On them fell much of the responsibility of the occasion. He hoped that in the coming campaign they could elect their candidate for Governor by a triumphant majority. Then the glowing stars and stripes would float in glory and peace, and the words of the immortal Webster would indeed be realized: "Liberty and Union, now and forever, one and inseparable."

Governor Orr retired with much the same ovation he had received when he was introduced to the audience. When the stamping, a style of applause so characteristic of American audiences, had ceased, enthusiastic individuals throughout the audience would rise up, and with a wave of the hat, propose three cheers for Gov. Orr. Of course all such requests were heartily responded to.

WASHINGTON, August 18, 1866.

The President in an interview with the New Hampshire delegation said, in reference to the Convention and his future policy. "We have now a policy and principles recognized and laid down by the most intelligent, able and patriotic body of men convened since the days of the Declaration of Independence. A recognition of this policy and principles would be required of those who receive office and patronage from the Government. It was a duty the Administration owed itself that power should be given to those who maintain the principles declared by that great body of national men who met this week in convention at Philadelphia."

New York, Aug. 19.—A Washington special dispatch states that Stanton will soon be appointed Minister to Spain and Gen. Steadman will be Secretary of War.

An Ottawa special dispatch says the Canadian authorities continue preparations to resist the Fenians. The troops at Quebec have been ordered to keep in readiness, and ten thousand canoes are being manufactured.

A letter from Heart's Content, of the 7th, states that the shore end of the cable got fouled with an anchor of a coast vessel on the 6th, but was released by a diver.

The shipment of specie to Europe since July 1st exceeds fifty-two millions.

The President has issued a Proclamation declaring that the insurrection which heretofore existed in the State of Texas is at an end, and is to be henceforth regarded in that State as the other States in which the said insurrection was declared at an end by the Proclamation of the 22d of April, 1866. The President proclaims that the said insurrection is at an end, and that peace, order and tranquility and civil authority now exist throughout the whole of the United States of America.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 19.—At a meeting of officers and soldiers, held last night at Willard's hotel, it was decided to hold a Convention of the soldiers North and South at Chicago, September 17th. A Committee was appointed to draft a call, which will be issued during the week. Gen. Steadman, Emory, Custar and other prominent officers were present.

During her illness she made frequent allusions of approaching death without terror or alarm, and often expressed a desire to depart and be with Christ in the "mansions of the blessed."

The funeral services were held at Nazareth Church, on the day of her burial, and conducted by the Rev. A. P. Smith, with appropriate and impressive exercises. The deceased has left three children, viz: two sons and a daughter, and many other relatives to lament their irreparable loss, but they have, however, the pleasing consolation to believe that their departed friend, who lived by faith, died in hope, now sleeps that blessed sleep in Christ Jesus.
