They had preserv-ed what they had fought so well for, but they had now a duty to perform—they had to pre-serve the Constitution of our fathers. On them fall much of the responsib lity of the occasion. He hoped that in the coming campaign they could elect their candidate for Governor by a trimmhant maiority. Then the clowing stars triumphant majority. Then the glowing stars and stripes would float in glory and peace, and the words of the immortal Webster would in-teed be realized: "Liberty and Union, now and forever, one and inseparable."

Governor Orr retired with much the same ovation he had received when he was introduced to the audience. When the stamping, a style of applause so characteristic of American audiences, had ceased, enthusiastic individuals throughout the audience would rise up, and with a wave of the hat, propose three cheers for Gov. Orr. Of course all such requests were heartily responded to.

WASHINGTON, August 18, 1866. The President in an interview with the New Hampshire delegation said, in reference to the Convention and his future policy. "We bave now a policy and principles recognized and laid down by the most intelligent, able and patriotic body of men convened since the days of the Declaration of Independence. A recognition of this policy and principles would be required of those who receive office and patronage from the Government. It was a duty the Administration owed itself that power should be given to these who maintain the principles declared by that great body of national men who met this week in convention at Philadelphia."

NEW YORK, Aug, 19 .- A Washington special despatch states that Stanton will soon be appointed Minister to Spain and Gen. Stead-

man will be Secretary of War. An Ottawa special despatch says the Canadian authorities continue preparations to resist the Fenians. The troops at Quebec have been ordersd to keep in readiness, and ten thousand canteens are being manufactured.
