Important Order.

HEADQUARTERS D. PARTMENT OF THE SOUTH, ? CHARLESTON, S. C., October 4, 1866. [General Orders No. 15.]

1. The Civil Courts of the United States for South Carolina are open, and all cases of which they have legal cogn zance will be remitted to them. Citizens held for trial for violations of the law of the United States, will be surrendered to the cus tody of the United States Marshall, on proper warrant. Depositions, evidence and papers in such cases will be forwarded to the United States District Attorney for South Carolina.

11. The Courts of the State of South Carolina, as now constituted and to be or ganized, are declared by law to le open to all persons, with equal civil rights therein, without distinction or discrimination in any particular, on account of color or former servitude. All cases, civil and crimi nal. in which the parties are civilians, will be turned over to the judicial tribunals of the State, having jurisdiction of the same. Civilians in military custody, awaiting trial for offences against the laws of South Carolina, will be surrentered on proper warrant to the custody of the Sheriff of the District in which the crime is charged to have been committed; and all depo sitions, proofs and papers in these cases will be transmitted to the Prosecuting So licitor for the Circuit in which such Dis trict Court is situated.

III. Military Provost Courts will be discontinued in the several Districts as soon as District Courts shall be organized therein. At the Military Reservation of Hilton Head, and on the Sea Islands in cluded within the testitorial limits of that Post and of the Post of Charleston, Provost Courts will be continued until further or-

iv. The Jails now in possession of the Military Authorities will be restored to the Sheriffs of the several Districts. Pris oners undergoing sentence of Military Courts, having less than thirty days of their terms of imprisonment unexpired. will be discharged. All other prisoners in Jails, undergoing sentence of Military Courts, will be sent under guard, with a brief statement of the case, showing the offence and term of imprisonment, to the Commanding Officer of the Post of Charles ton, who will cause them to be confined in Castle Pinckney for the remainder of their respective terms of imprisonment

V. Corporal punishment shall not be inflicted upon any person other than a minor, and then only by the parent, guardian, te cher, or one to whom said minor is lawfully bound by indenture of appren ticeship. Nor shall any person be sold to service as a punishment for crime, or for other cause, by any authority whatever (G. O. No. 1, Par. XVIII., Headquarters Department of South Carolina, January 1st, 1866.

v 1. The laws of the States respectively in this Department defining and punishing vagrancy, applicable to white persons, may be enforced against all persons, nev ertheless, no one who shall have used rea sonable diligerce to obtain employment, or who shall be unable to work by reason of infirmity, shall be deemed a vagrant. (G. O. No. 1, Par. XIII., Headquarters Department of South Carolina, January 1st, 1866.)

VII. No prosecution or suit shall be entertained in the Civil Courts within this Military Department against officers or soldiers of the armies of the United States, or persons in anywise thereto belonging, subject to military authority, charged with acts done in their military capacity, or pursuant to orders from prop er military authority; nor against loyal citizens or persons charged with acts done, directly or indirectly, against the rebel forces during the rebellion; and all persons, their agents or servants, charged with the occupation of abandoned lands and tene ments, or the possession or custody of any kind of property whatsoever, in cases where such occupation, use or possession, was authorized by the President, or by any of the civil or military departments of the Government, shall be protected from any recoveries, penalties or damages that may

VIII. District and Post Commanders will report any instance of a failure of justice by reason of the neglect or refusal of any Court, Magistrate or Officer, to perform any official act properly required of him, whereby due and rightful protection to persons or property shall have been denicd

IX. District and Post Commander will arrest all persons who have been, or may hereafter be, charged with the commission of crimes and offences against officers, cases where the civil authorities he ve fail two. ed, neglected or are unable to arrest and bring such parties to trial, and to detain them in military confinement until such time as a proper judicial tribunal may be resdy and willing to try them. (G. O. No. 44, Headquarters of the Army, A. G. O.,

X. District and Post Commanders will, as heretofore, in compliance with existing orders, extend all proper facilities and protection to the officers and agents of the Bureau of Refugees, Freedmen and Aban doned Lands, in the discharge of their duties.

XI. In remitting to the civil authorities the jurisdiction specified in this order, all persons are enjoined to yield unreserved and unhesitating obedience to the author ity and laws of the State, and of the Unit ed States; and, for the sake of justice, order and peace, and so that no occasion may arise hereafter for the exercise of military authority in matters of ordinary civil ad ministration concerning the freed people, the Major-General Commanding respecttully and earnestly commends to the au thorities and people of South Carolina the patient, considerate and impartial execution of the laws in all proceedings affecting the numerous and hitherto dependent class of persons recently clothed with civil rights, and made amenable to the obligations of citizens.

DESTITUTION IN ALABAMA. - About a week ago the President received a com munication from Governor Patten, of Alabama, representing that great destitution and suffering existed in that State, and requesting that the issue of rations by the Freedmen's Bureau be continued after October 1st (the day of stoppage by the provisions of Circular No. 10,) as the State authorities were unable to provide food and shelter for indigent persons. The President referred the matter to Major General Howard, Commissioner of the Freedmen's Bureau, who addressed a let ter to the Secretary of War, recommend ing a compliance with the request of Gov ernor Patten. General Howard suggested that relief to the amount of not over \$40 000 per month, for three months, be grated. To this Secretary Stanton assented by allowing the issuing of corn and bacon for the period specified. General Swayne was directed to carry out the order for the intended relief.
