Arriving here, he provid-ed her with a home of questionable comfort, in a rude shanty on Bay street, near Sibley's al-ley. Boyd, we are informed, has manifested great uneasinoss since his arrival here, lest the falter of the girl should pursue and over-take him, and has been making digent inqui ry as to the means by which he and his compaulon could escape from the city on the free list, as he claimed not to have o dollar in the world. house, yesterday morning. Boyd was said to be absent at work in Hamburg. Failing to get a glimpse of him, the father succeeded in inducing his daughter to return to her home, without having any collision with the man to whom she had committed hersel? - Augusta Constitutionalist.


