"The Committee of the Whole, to whom was referred " A bill to blend the Courts of Law and Equity in this State, and for other purposes," "A bill to amend the third section of the Act to reform and amend the Judiciary System of this State, passed the 18th day of December, 1835," "A bill to change the times for holding the Courts of Common Pleas and Sessions, the Courts of Equity, and the Court of Appeals," " A bill to establish a Court of Appeals, and for other purposes;" also, certain Resolutions, respecting a Court of Appeals; beg leave to report, that they have had the same under consideration, and recommend to the House the rejection of all the bills referred to them, and the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, 'That all Appeals from the Courts of Law, shall be heard and determined in a Court of Appeals, consisting of all the law Judges: and that all appeals in Equity, shall be heard and determined in a Court of Appeals, consisting of all the chancellors. That the said Courts of Appeal shall meet at the same time, and be held at the close of the circuits.
