THE STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA.
WHEREAS, RICHARD M. VALENTINE, Esq., who at the General Election held in April 1869, was chosen a member of the House of Representatives for the Election District of Abbeville, to serve for two years, has since said election resigned, And, whereas, the Constitution of the State of South Carolina directs that in such a case a Writ of Election shall be issued by the Speaker of the House of Representatives for the purpose of filling the vacancy thus occasioned, for the remainder of the term for which the Member so resigned was elected to serve: Now, therefore, you and each of you are hereby required, after due advertisement and with a strict regard to all the provisions of the Constitution and Laws of the said State, to hold an election, for the House of Representatives, for the Election aforesaid, to serve for the remainder of the term for which the said Richard M. Valentine was elected: the Polls to be opened at the various places of Election in the said District, on WEDNESDAY the twenty-seventh day of October, 1869, by the various sets of Managers to count the votes publicly immediately after the final closing of the polls at the Precincts where the votes have been taken; make out a certificate of the result, to be signed by the Managers, or a majority of them, and taken to the Court House of Abbeville County, or place now fixed by law for counting the votes, on THURSDAY the twenty-eighth day of said month, by one or more of the said Managers; and the Managers, or a majority of them, who may assemble, shall proceed to examine the aforesaid certificate, and declare the result of the Election.
