MANAGER VERCHOTT SECURES BIG HAWAIIAN ATTRACTION FOR ABBEVILLE

Manager Verchott has secured a large company of native Hawaiians for a visit to this city on next Monday night, December 10th. The company is composed of real Hawaiians who are recognized as the most popular musical artists of the day.

The organization presents a Hawaiian musical satire in two parts. The first part shows the beautiful tropical beach at Waikiki, also showing the famous Diamond Head Mountain with its volcano with real smoke issuing therefrom.

Members of the company represent Hawaii's most famous instrumentalists, singers and dancers. Five members of the organization came direct from the Royal Palace, Honolulu, where they have been entertainers for the Dowager Queen.

Mr. M. R. Bell, a native Hawaiian is conductor of the organization and is recognized as king of the steel instrument and the Hawaiian flute.

Princess Lehula, who is a member of the company, bears the distinction of coming from one of the royal families of the islands. She is creating much favorable comment in presenting native Hawaiian dances. There is nothing suggestive that could possibly cause any criticism in the dances as presented by the Princess.

This organization drew immense crowds at the Palace of Music at the Panama Pacific International Exposition, and from the great patronage and appreciation shown in other cities, their visit here will no doubt, be greeted by a packed house.

THE WILLIAMSPORT SUN SAYS:

HAWAIIANS PRESENT AN UNUSUAL PROGRAM.

Majestic Theatre Patrons Were Greatly Pleased With the Offering.

"An unusual program by Hawaiian musicians was presented at the Majestic theatre last evening by a capable company. They were greeted by a large and appreciative audience and were forced to respond to numerous encores. W. S. Jones presented Bell's Famous Hawaiians in a musical satire, in two parts, that entirely pleased all present. This is the first time that a company of these people has visited this theatre and given a complete performance, and the patrons of the theatre responded heartily.

The first scene was that of Waikiki beach at Honolulu, and here the men played on their instruments and sang songs in their native tongue. Solo numbers, quartet numbers and instrument selections marked the first part of the program, which closed with a realistic Hula Hula dance by Princess Lei Lehula. In this part M. R. Pele favored the audience with several numbers on the steel guitar. He was forced to answer with several encores. He was accompanied by J. Peleika.

The second scene was that of a parlor at the Alexander Young hotel in Honolulu city. During this part the violinist E. Russell carried away the audience with the selections on his instrument and his appearance twice in this part of the program brought him an unusual amount of applause. Popular music was rendered by Russell after his opening number. J. Hailama captured the audience from his first appearance on the stage, and his solo numbers were applauded until he was forced to stop because of the length of the program. The program closed with "Your Country Needs You" and "We're Going Over," by G. Mederious and company and the singing of the "Star-Spangled Banner," with a woman dressed in an American flag holding a prominent position on the stage, the audience and company standing.
