### POOR NET RETURN FOR RAILROADS

Washington, May 5.—With an estimated property investment of \$2,284,000,000, Southern railroad systems reported to the interstate commerce commission today that they were deriving less than 1 per cent net return and would require an increase of \$120,770,000 to bring the revenue to the 6 per cent basis provided in the transportation act.

C. H. Markham, president of the Illinois Central, in submitting these statements in his brief in support of the request of the Southern roads for increased rates, estimated the increase required to be 20.7 per cent on the total of 30.9 per cent, if derived entirely from freight, as expressed to the commission.

shall not be disturbed, the statement recommended special treatment in the case of carload commodity rates on coal, cement, coke, stone and other low grade mineral products. Increases proposed on coal and coke vary from 30 to 90 cents a ton, on cement from 50 cents to \$1.40 a ton on building lime from 35 cents to \$1 a ton and on sand, gravel, etc., from 26 to 50 cents a ton.

It is proposed to advance all other rates 31 per cent.
