

Naturalist, Ansel F. Hall, of Yosemite National Park, has prepared this section of a giant Sequoia, which was felled by a storm in 1919, to show visitors how old trees are. This tree, which is fourteen feet in diameter at the base, is 996 years old, a youngster, as compared to 4000 years, the estimated age of the Grizzly Giaant, the largest tree in Yosemite. The space between the Naturalist's forefinger and thumb measures the span of a human long life to compare with the span of the tree's life.
