Commenting upon this proceeding, the Baltimore Clipper says:

" The memorial expresses, we believe, the universal scatiment of the Southern States, and of some of the free States also, as is indicated by their legislation forbidding free persons of color to enter their borders. This feeling has been produced by the action of the abolitionists, and will continue to increase until that class of people shall be excluded from the Southern States. This result we consider as inevitable. The mobocratic disposition exhibited by the free negroes of Boston, their open defiance of the law : and the encouragement which they received frem a degraded portion of the white population, have tended to strengthen the disposition to expel them from States where their rapid increase may endanger public tranquility, and perhaps lead to their extermination. The relations existing between these people and the white population might have remained undisturbed for years to come, had it not been for the officious interference of the abolitionists By their direct efforts to deprive slaveholders of their property, and their inflammatory ap peals to the colored population of the South -their protection of fugitive slaves, and encouragement to both slave and free to resist the laws of the country, they have produced an exciting state of feeling, which will render it impossible for free persons of color to retain their present position in Southern communities. However this condition of things may be regretted, it has been forced upon the South by the pretended friendship of North ern fanaties for the Southern race. The movement for the removal of the free colored people will become general; and should all the free States follow the example of Indiana and Iowa, in denying admission to these people on their removal from the South, they will be reduced to the necessity of seeking the colonies in Africa for homes and safety.

A HEBREW WITHOUT GUILE .-- The attention of the world is always caught by military deeds, and a nation's gratitude is fully be stowed on the soldier. But it should not be forgotten that the civilian is as useful, patriotic, and meritorious as the soldier. Robert Morris is comparatively unknown, yet he sacrificed a princely fortune for the cause of American liberty. He pledged his credit and wealth, and raised the means to clothe, feed and arm the troops. The battle of Trenton, the campaign in Delaware and the Jerseys, world never have occurred but for his means

Another individual, who assisted his adop ted country with his fortune, was Mr. Hayne Solomon, a Polish Jew, of Philadelphia. His beirs have now a claim before Congress, for the payment in part of the sums advanced by him for the actual maintenance of the members of Congress. At the time of his death he held \$353,729 against the Confederacy .-The letters of Madison and other cininen men are filed as vouchers of those loans, and of the generosity of the man who refused any remuneration, except the return of the princi pal. The books of the Bank of North Amerien show the receipts by Robert Morris from Hayne Solomon of \$200,000 in cash. It is certainly one of the strongest claims ever presented to the justice of the nation.

"This law is not only a palpable and dangerous violation of the Constitution, but is equally subversive of all the great principles of liberty, which a free people should cherish. The duty of the people in respect to an unconstitutional and oppressive law, must always be in some measure a question of expediency, depending on the circumstances of the case.
