In saving one man's land from being sold, you may cause the property of many others to be sacriced. This law operates with peculiar ardahip upon merchants. They necessarily have to run consideradle risk it cre-diting so many; and their best customers in most cases, do not own over five hundred dollars worth of land. They are, therefore, compelled to refuse them credit or to risk their living, and trust entirely to the honor of individuals. If a debtor forgets that he has got a single tem in an acsount, he may consider the merchant dishonest, and refuse to pay any part, or he may make a thing of the kind the pretext for not paying. After he has given you his note, he may put you off for all times to ing that he will pay it-and when you and your city creditor gets tired of wating, and you sue him, he gets angry, and thinks you have treated him so badly, that he won't pay it at all. Such will be some of the fruits of this much lauded Homested Law, please to look at, but bitter to the taste. The evil will not be so seriously felt at first because fear of suffering by losing his credit, will, to some extent, make him pay up. But let him begin to feel, that whether he pays his debts or not, that he can keep five handred dollars worth of land, and sooner or late, unless he is almost an exception he will claim his privileges, and cease to pay his debts. Some political reasons have been urged in favor of the law—that it would attach men to the State, and prevent emigration; but in reply, it may be answered, that honest men will pay their debts, even if they have to sell the land themselves, and will still move away; and as to dishonesty ones, the State will lose but little in parting with them. Upon the whole, it seems to be hazardous experiment, and the people of South Carolina, with one voice, should demand its repeal.

ACKECTURE, POPULATION, AND MARY FACTURES. The Report of J. C. G. Konnedy, Esq., the Superintendent of the Census, is one of the most valuable documents of the day. It shoulds with facts and figures on important subjects, derived from the most sufficitie sources. We proceed to notice
