#### Serious Accident,

The horses became frightened at some object opposite the residence of Mr. Joel Towers, and dashed off at a rapid speed. The noseband became detached from the tongue of the carriage, and having no means of holding back, the horses were cempelled to run to keep out of the way, there being a gentle declivity in the street. The driver jumped off, and the horses being permitted to go at pleasure, on turning the street near the old livery stable, fell into a gulley and remained stationary.

The carriage was capsized and completely demolished—torn all to pieces. Miss Lanham was uninjured. Mrs Mantz and Miss Pinnell were badly hurt, but are now in a fair way of recovery. Miss Hobbs was slighty injured, but is now up and able to attend school.
