Camden Cotton Market. The demand for Cotton for the past few days has been quiet but steady, the receipts being comparatively light, at prices ranging from 8 1/4 to 9 3/4.

COLUMBIA, Oct. 15.—Cotton.—A very brisk and active demand prevailed for this article in our market-to-day; prices were very full, and in some instances an advance of 1-16 to 1-8 cent. was obtained. 233 bales were sold, at prices ranging from 8 1/4 to 9 1/2 cents.

Executive Department, S. Carolina. OCTOBER, 14, 1852. WHEREAS, the Congress of the United States, by an Act passed and approved on the twentieth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, enacted, "that the Electors of President and Vice President shall be appointed on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November of the year in which they are to be appointed." And whereas the existing law of this State provides that the Electors shall be appointed by the Legislature: And whereas the Legislature of this State will not be in regular session at the time prescribed by the aforesaid act for the appointment of electors: THEREFORE, be it known, that I, JOHN H. MEANS, Governor in and over this State, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Constitution, authorizing the Governor, on extraordinary occasions, to convene the General Assembly, whose terms of office have not expired, and those who have been now recently elected, and the members of the House of Representatives who have been also now recently elected, to convene in Columbia, on the FIRST MONDAY in November next ensuing, that they may be present in the House of Representatives on the said Tuesday next, after the first said Monday, to appoint Electors of President and Vice President of the United States, in conformity with the act of Congress aforesaid: Given under my hand and the seal of the State aforesaid, at Columbia, the 14th day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, and in the 77th year of the Independence of the United States of America. COLUMBIA, October 1, 1852.
