In the House, in response to the message, Hon. J. I. Middleton offered the following resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

Be it Resolved, That the General Assembly of South Carolina deplores the benevolence which have fallen upon the confederacy at large in the decease of those illustrious citizens and eminent orators and statesmen, Henry Clay and Daniel Webster; and that whilst we have recalled to us the memory of sorrows nearer home, it but adds to the poignancy of our grief to know that others mourn as we have mourned.

Resolved, That we offer, with fraternal feelings, our condolence to our Co-States of the Union on this sorrowful occasion, and more particularly do we tender it to the Commonwealths of Kentucky and Massachusetts.

Resolved, That his Excellency the Governor be requested to communicate a copy of his message to the General Assembly, together with the foregoing resolutions, to the Executives of Kentucky and Massachusetts.

A similar action was had in the Senate, where the resolutions, seconded by Hon. F. J. Moses, were adopted.

After some formal unimportant business, both houses adjourned sine die for the present session, at 25 minutes to 3 o'clock.

THE MARKET.—Saturday morning, Cotton.—The sales yesterday amounted to somewhat over 1400 bales, prices ranging

from 8 1/2 a. 10—the general aspect of the market without any perceptible change.

COLUMBIA MARKET, Nov. 6. COTTON.—The cotton market to-day was quite but very steady; in prices there was no change from those of the previous day, and the market closed firm. 87 bales changed hands, at prices ranging from 8 1/2 to 8 3/4 cents.

Later from Europe—Arrival of the Aurica. NEW-ORLEANS, Nov. 4. Four thousand bales of Cotton were sold on Thursday, at New-Orleans, at steady prices; and after business had concluded, the Aurica's advices were received, from New York, by the Western Telegraph which report that the week's sales at Liverpool, amounted to 95,000 bales, and that prices were firm and unchanged.
