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TOWN ORDINANCES. The Intendant and Wardens of the Town of Lancaster in Council assembled, do hereby enact, that in all cases be confined to the immediate business of the individual contracting.

TOWN ORDINANCES.

1st. That every itinerant trader, auctioneer, or vendor of any goods, wares, or merchandise, offering the same for sale within the corporate limits of the Town of Lancaster, shall before offering for sale, pay into the Treasury of said Town the sum of five dollars for each day he or they may offer such goods, wares, or merchandise; and upon failure, neglect or refusal to pay the tax specified, the person or persons so refusing, neglecting or failing, shall be subject to such penalties as Council in their discretion may impose.

2d. That each and every retail dealer in spirituous liquors, shall, before engaging in business, be required to enter into a good and sufficient Bond with approved sureties, and to pay to Council, for the uses of the town, the sum of Four Hundred Dollars, said amount to be payable quarterly at the rate of seventy-five dollars per quarter for the quarters ending 31st of July and October, and for the quarter commencing the first of November and February, respectively, there shall be paid the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars per quarter before license is issued.

3d. That all cruises, theatrical performances, or other exhibitions of a like kind, there shall be imposed a tax of not less than five nor more than fifty dollars per day, within discretion of Council; upon all billiard tables, kept for profit, a tax of twenty-five dollars per annum; on all bagatelle tables, a tax of ten dollars per annum; on all ten or nine pin or other pin alleys, ten dollars per annum, payable in all cases in advance, and before license is issued; provided, that nothing herein shall be construed, as preventing any person from obtaining a license for a less period than one year for the purpose.

4th. That all persons liable to road duty, living within the corporate limits of the town, shall be required to perform such duty, when notified, not to exceed six days in any one year, under the direction of such person or persons as Council may designate for the purpose.

5th. That all persons who may be engaged in any period of one year, within the corporate limits of the said town, or in any riotous or disorderly conduct unbecoming good citizens, or who may be found publicly drunk, therein, or who shall be guilty of any act of open obscenity, or who shall be indicted profane of speech, or be engaged in any riotous, or any threatening conduct, indecent or dangerous to the annoyance of any citizen or citizens of said town, or who shall discharge any guns, or pistols or other fire-arms within the limits of said town, except in defence of life or property, or for the necessary killing of some animal, as may appear, or who shall keep open on the Sabbath any place of business or amusement, which by the peace and good order of the said town may be impaired, shall be fined in such amount or imprisoned for such time, or both, as Council in its discretion and within the limits of its authority may determine.

boys, and all wrestling or running, shall be prohibited on Main street, in the Town of Lancaster, and it shall be the duty of the Marshal of said town, together with the Sheriff and his deputies of the County of Lancaster, to preserve the peace and good order thereof, and to enforce the observance of the foregoing ordinances and all other ordinances that have been or may hereafter be passed by Council; to arrest all persons violating any ordinance of the said town and bring them before the Intendant or a Ward acting in his stead; and it shall be the duty of the Marshal or other person officer, after the arrest of any person or persons engaged in a breach of the peace, or violating any ordinance, to keep in safe custody all such person or persons, and produce them before the said Intendant or Warden acting in his stead, or before Council for their examination and such punishment as justice may require, consistent with the authority in such cases provided.
