Much Complaint of Blind Tigers in Lancaster County.

A Special to The State from
Lancaster, March 13, says:
Sheriff John P. Hunter says that
he hears many complaints from
different sections of the county of
whiskey selling and that he would
be glad if he could always appre-
hend the violators of the dispen-
sary law and bring them to jus-
tice, but that he cannot neglect
his other work in the sheriff's of-
fice. But he says he is perfectly
willing to give his spare time to

as well as all other laws. He
says that if a good, active man
was appointed State constable in

be to look after blind tigers and
nothing else they would soon be
run out of business and many
other violations of the law would
cease.
