Governor Heyward Asked To Resign.

People of Westminster Make the Demand.—On Account of Hoyt Hayes Case.

The State, 23rd Inst. Gov. Heyward has been asked to resign. The demand comes from people of Westminster in Oconee county. The names of some good, honest and substantial citizens are said to be among those who have signed this petition. And it is on account of the action of Gov. Heyward in the Hoyt Hayes case.

This is the most interesting case which has come before a governor for action since Wade Haynes was hanged in Columbia when he commuted the sentence of Hoyt Hayes, Gov. Heyward made a statement, and he has not had much to say of the case since. But those who visit his office daily know of the satisfaction it has been to Gov. Heyward to receive letters from all over the State commending him for his action in this matter. The letters come from people of every walk of life, and Gov. Heyward is deeply appreciative of the manner in which his action was received.

Following is the petition. Westminster, S. C., Oct. 20, 1904. To his excellency D. C. Heyward, Gov. of South Carolina, Columbia, S. C.

We the undersigned citizens of Oconee County, S. C., respectfully ask for your resignation as Gov. of S. C. for the following reasons:

1st. That the course you have pursued in the Hoyt Hayes case is detrimental to law and order, and has a tendency toward lynch law by ignoring the actions of Juries and the rulings of Judges.

2nd. We feel that you are assuming too much and that your actions are more in accordance with the rulings of an emperor of South Carolina.

112 names were signed to the petition.

A Special dispatch to New York Herald from Washington gives further details of the suicide of Judge Pritchard's son.

Crazed, possibly as the result of long service in the troops, Second Lieut. William D. Pritchard, son of United States Circuit Judge Pritchard of North Carolina, committed murder and suicide today in Stotsenburg camp, Philippine Islands.

Both officers were in the Thirtieth U. S. cavalry. Pritchard in Troop F and Deen in Troop D. No one here knew of any trouble between them, and insanity is regarded as the only explanation.

Hester's Weekly Statement.

New Orleans, Oct. 21.—Secretary Hester's weekly cotton statement issued today shows for the 21 days of October, an increase over the same period year before last of 299,000.

For the 51 days of the season that have elapsed the aggregate is ahead of the same days of last year 1,008,000, and ahead of the same days year before last 405,000.

The amount brought into sight during the past week has been 563,632 bales, against 443,625 for the same seven days last year and 479,701 year before.

NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR STATE AND COUNTY OFFICERS, AND FOR AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

(State Seal.)

State of South Carolina, County of Lancaster.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the several precincts established by law in Lancaster County, on Tuesday, November 8, 1904, for the following officers, to wit:

Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Secretary of State, Attorney-General, State Treasurer, Comptroller-General, Superintendent of Education, Adjutant-General, Inspector-General, One Railroad Commissioner, County Supervisor, County Superintendent of Education, Sheriff, Clerk of Court, Coroner, Solicitor, and two Representatives.

Pursuant to the Constitution of South Carolina an election will be held at the same time and place for amendments to the Constitution of South Carolina, pursuant to the terms of Joint Resolutions Nos. 283, 384 and 385 (Acts of South Carolina, pp. 674, 675 and 676), as follows:

A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing to Amend Section 9, of Article III, of the State Constitution, so as to Provide for Biennial Sessions of the General Assembly.

Section 1. Be it Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of South Carolina be submitted to the qualified electors at the next general election for Representatives, and if a majority of the electors qualified to vote for members of the General Assembly, voting thereon, shall vote in favor of such amendment, and a majority of each branch of the General Assembly, shall after such election and before another, ratify the same amendment by yeas and nays, Section 9, of Article III, of the Constitution, relating to the Legislative Department, be amended by adding after the word "place" in line ten of said Section, the words "and the end of the said sessions shall be held at the same time and place biennially," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

The annual session of the General Assembly heretofore elected, fixed by the Constitution of the year eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, to convene on the fourth Tuesday of November in the year of eighteen hundred and ninety-five, is hereby postponed, and the same shall be convened and held in the city of Columbia on the second Tuesday of January in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-six.

The first session of the General Assembly elected under this Constitution shall convene in Columbia on the second Tuesday of January in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-six, and thereafter annually at the same time and place until the end of the session occurring in 1906, after which the said sessions shall be held at the same time and place biennially.

Should the casualties of war or contagious diseases render it unsafe to meet at the seat of government, then the Governor only, by proclamation, appoint a more secure and convenient place of meeting. Members of the General Assembly shall not receive any compensation for more than forty days of any one session. Provided, That this limitation shall not affect the first four sessions of the General Assembly under this Constitution.

Sec. 2. That the question of adopting the amendment proposed in the foregoing section shall be submitted to the electors as follows: Those in favor of the amendment shall deposit a ballot with the following words plainly printed or written thereon: "Constitutional amendment by Section 9 of Article III of the State Constitution, adding after the word 'place' in line ten of said section the words 'and the end of the said sessions shall be held at the same time and place biennially.'—Yes."

Those opposed to said amendment shall deposit a ballot with the following words plainly printed or written thereon: "Constitutional amendment by Section 9 of Article III of the State Constitution, adding after the word 'place' in line ten of said section the words 'and the end of the said sessions shall be held at the same time and place biennially.'—No."

Approved the 18th day of February, A. D. 1904.

A JOINT RESOLUTION to Amend the Constitution so as to Permit the General Assembly to Enact Local and Special Laws on the Subject of Laying Out, Opening, Altering, and Working Roads and Highways, and as to the Age at Which Citizens Shall be Subject to Road or Other Public Duty.

Section 1. Be it Resolved by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, That the following amendment to the Constitution be agreed to, and that the two questions involved in such amendment be submitted separately at the next general election to the electors qualified to vote for members of the House of Representatives, viz: that there shall be added to the Constitution the following additional Article, to be numbered properly in the consecutive order of its adoption, to be designated as "Article of Amendments to the Constitution," which shall read as follows:

"Article of Amendments to the Constitution."
Section 1. The General Assembly of this State may enact local or special laws concerning the laying out, opening, altering or working roads or highways, and concerning the providing for the age at which citizens shall be subject to road duty, and concerning drainage.

Sec. 2. That Subdivision II and Subdivision IX of Section 34, of Article III, of the Constitution, are hereby repealed.

Approved the 18th day of February, A. D. 1904.

A JOINT RESOLUTION Proposing to Amend Section 7, Article VIII, of the Constitution, Relating to Municipal Bonded Indebtedness.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina, That the following amendment to Section 7, Article VIII of the Constitution, be agreed to: Add as the end thereof the following words: provided further, that the limitations imposed by this Section and by Section 5, Article X, of this Constitution,

shall not apply to bonded indebtedness incurred by the city of Greenville but said city of Greenville may increase its bonded indebtedness in the manner provided in said Section of said Article to an amount not exceeding fifteen per cent of the value of the taxable property therein, where the proceeds of said bonds are applied solely to the payment of past indebtedness, to expenses and liabilities incurred or to be incurred in the improvements of streets and sidewalks, and for providing sewerage for said city, or any part thereof, for purchasing, establishing, owning or operating waterworks or electric light plants.

Sec. 2. But the question of adopting this amendment shall be submitted at the next general election to the electors as follows: Those in favor of the amendment shall deposit a ballot with the following words plainly printed or written thereon: "Constitutional amendment by Section 7 of Article VIII of the Constitution, relating to municipal corporations and public regulations, Yes." Those opposed to said amendment shall cast a ballot with the following words plainly printed or written thereon: "Constitutional amendment of Section seven, Article eight, of the Constitution, relating to municipal corporations and public regulations, No."

Approved the 18th day of February, A. D. 1904.

Gin and Cotton Burned.
