Hayes then told Bird he was a d--- liar, whereupon Bird left his cart and horse and started for Hayes. Hryes drew an old-fashioned pistol, loaded with shot, and shot him through the heart.

On the day of election the Managers must organize by the election of a Chairman and a Clerk, if necessary. The chairman elected shall be empowered to administer oaths. The Managers have the power to fill any vacancy, and if none of the Managers attend, the citizens can appoint from among the qualified voters the Managers, who, after being sworn, can conduct the election.

At the close of the election the Managers and Clerk must proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein, and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result for each office and for each amendment to the Constitution and sign the same. Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots and written statements of the result of the election.

One of the above named Managers for each precinct must call upon the Board of Commissioners, at the Court House Nov. 5th, 1904, to receive ballot boxes, poll lists and instructions and to qualify.

On the day of the election the Managers must organize by the election of a chairman, a clerk may be named if necessary. The chairman elected is empowered to administer oath to the other Managers and clerk.

The Managers have the power to fill any vacancy, and if none of the managers attend, the citizens can appoint Managers from among the qualified voters, who, after being sworn, can conduct the election.

At the close of election the managers must proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein and continue without adjournment until the same is completed and make a statement of the result thereof and sign the same.

Within three days thereafter, the chairman of the board, or someone designated by the board, must deliver to the commissioners of Federal Elections the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots, and signed statements of the result of the election.
