

Young Man Arrested On Serious Charge.

David Ott is in Orangeburg Jail for Alleged Assault.—Son of Prosperous Farmer.

Orangeburg, Oct 31. A warrant was issued this morning by Magistrate C. P. Brunson of this city upon affidavit of Mr. Adam L. Shumaker, charging an assault upon his daughter, Miss Lula Shumaker.

Mr. Shumaker is a well known farmer who resides in Goodby township, a few miles this side of Florence, and bears an excellent reputation as a good citizen and neighbor. The accused is a son of Mr. A. A. Ott, who is a successful farmer, residing on the State road only a few miles distance from the home of Mr. Shumaker. Young Ott is about 20 years of age, while the young lady is said to be about 17 years of age.

The story is that yesterday afternoon one of Mr. Shumaker's sons and two of his girls went out to Jerusalem church a few miles away, to attend a funeral, and as they were leaving young Ott asked Miss Lula to ride with him. It was late in the afternoon and he lingered behind the other buggies going in the same direction. After they had passed he stopped in some woods near the road and, it is alleged, committed the crime. He then drove the young lady near her father's house and told her to get out and walk home. This she refused to do through mortification. He then took her to his father's house. Young Ott then left home and went to the house of Amos Dantzler to spend the night. It was not until this morning that Mr. Shumaker was apprised of his daughter's whereabouts and condition, and this information came first to him from Mr. Dantzler, to whom young Ott had told of the occurrence making him his confidant. Mr. Shumaker went to the home of Mr. Ott for his daughter and with his wife ascertained that young Ott had accomplished his purpose and then he set out for Orangeburg to intercept Ott. His information was that Ott was coming to Orangeburg early this morning for the purpose of disposing of his horse and buggy and to take the first train to leave the country.

The young man had several scratches on his face and the contention is that he received them in the struggle with the young lady. It had also been said that he had been drinking.

As soon as Mr. Shumaker reached Orangeburg this morning he consulted his attorneys Messrs. Raysor and Summers, and the warrant of the arrest of Ott was procured. Constable Fournes was sent out by Magistrate Brunson to search for young Ott and he was informed that he had started back for the country with a negro in a buggy.

Mr. Fournes however, found Ott in the city, arrested him at once and placed him in jail.

Young Ott denies the above story and gave the constable a different version. When the girl refused to go to her home he took her to his father's home and showed her to a room up stairs told his mother of her presence in the house and he then went to his own room and retired. He said that he came to Orangeburg this morning to return a horse that he had bought and had a negro to take him back to his home but was prevented from returning by his arrest.

It is said that young Ott had

been paying attention to the young lady but that Mr. Shumaker objected to his attentions and would not allow him to come to his house.

All the people concerned have a good standing in the county.

There is some conflict between the current reports concerning the affair, hence the contentions of both sides are given above as nearly correct as possible.

Work of an Immigrant.

What Mr. F. W. Carlay, a Swede Has Done in Greenwood County.

Greenwood, Oct. 29.—Greenwood can furnish a good instance of the good work of immigrants in the record of Mr. F. W. Carlay, a native of Sweden, who has a farm about two miles from town. He bought this farm, containing 55 acres, three years ago and paid in the neighborhood of \$300 an acre for it. He and his sons have found plenty to do on this small farm, and so well have they succeeded that a few days ago Mr. Carlay refused an offer of \$500 an acre for the land. This year, with their two horses, they have made 25 bales of cotton and about 400 bushels of corn, besides a good many other incidentals. Mr. Carlay is a Swede, but has been in America 40 years. He has bought and paid for several places which he has rented out. He is a hatter by trade, and before coming to America worked at his trade in all the principal cities of Europe and spent some years in Australia. When he came to America he was attracted to farming, he said because of the fact that he did not have the capital to engage in any other business, and by close application to farming and always practicing that thrift which is characteristic of his people he has succeeded. He never undertakes too much. His example is an excellent protest against the almost universal practice of working more land than is necessary. On his present farm he shows that it is all in the man and not in the land, and that the careful cultivation of a small tract will pay better than the careless cultivation of a large one.

Baldwin's Airship Makes Another Flight.

A Trip of 36 minutes Was Made Returning to the Spot From Whence it Started.

St. Louis, Nov. 1.—The second successful flight of the Baldwin airship was made at the world's fair today, under the guidance of A. R. Knabenshue of Toledo, Ohio, who maneuvered the California Arrow at will, high above the western portion of the exposition grounds and descended in the stadium, adjoining the aerial concourse, amid the cheering thousands, after a flight of 36 minutes. Yesterday Knabenshue took the airship up to an altitude of 2,000 feet and circling around descending in the aerial concourse within 100 feet of his starting point. Today he went up to an altitude of about 1,600 feet and after directing the course of his aerial vessel at will, descended on the exact spot upon which he had descended the to land.

Satisfied with the demonstration of the air ship over short courses during these two trials, Inventor Baldwin announced at the conclusion of the flight that Knabenshue will tomorrow undertake a 15 mile flight over a designated course, the choice of the course to be left to newspapermen, and the flight to be made regardless of the wind conditions.

During his flight today Knabenshue performed a series of maneuvers, shooting in one direction for a short distance, turning quickly, turning quickly and shooting off in the opposite direction, traversed a letter 'S' course then dipped and came down several hundred feet, tilted the prow and ascended again to the original altitude and completed the series by turning the airship in such a short space that it seemed the vessel swung round on a pivot.

Both Sides Lost Heavily in Fight Near Yansintum.

Mukden, Oct. 29.—The Japanese assumed the offensive on Oct. 27 at Yansintum, half way between Bentsiaputze and Fengtiapu on the Mukden road. The whole day was passed by the artillery in preparation for a bombardment of the Russian positions. Towards evening a whole regiment moved out to capture the hill on which is a Buddhist temple, a mile south of Yansintum. The temple was held by a Russian battalion with two machine guns. A fierce fight with cold steel strewed the summit of the hill with corpses. The Russians were outnumbered, their machine guns were dismantled and they were compelled to fall back upon their main positions, carrying with them the barrels of their machine guns. The Russian artillery then swept the hill with such a hail of projectiles that the Japanese were unable to remain there. Heavy losses were inflicted on both sides.

"I am confident that New York will go for Parker. As to New Jersey and Connecticut, I am not so sure. I think that our young man Davis, will be able to take West Virginia. Oh, no, his age will not have any effect further than having given him a long time to electioneer and get influence. I am also confident that we have a good showing for several of the western doubtful states.
