Fire At Waxhaw.

On Friday night last fire destroyed the general merchandise establishment of Davis Brothers and Gordon's Grocery store at Waxhaw, N. C. The fire originated in the latter store. The losses aggregated about \$15,000, with partial insurance. The Jackson Drug Co., was considerably damaged by the fire.

One Man Killed and two Wounded.

Yesterday while coming in town on a wagon John Sadler was stopped just South of the depot by constable J. B. Connor who told him that he had a warrant for him for selling whiskey and would have to arrest him. Sadler replied that he had no time to be arrested and with an oath said "I'll settle the matter right here. I'll kill you," at the same time drawing a pistol from the inside breast pocket of his coat and opening fire on Mr. Connor. As quick as possible Mr. Connor drew his pistol and returned the fire. Mr. Connor received a wound in his right arm which also grazed his side, and a wound in his chin, the latter wound knocking him down. Sadler received but one wound, the ball struck him about the elbow and shattering his arm so badly that amputation was necessary. Mr. Connor, though he fell held to Sadler's coat sleeve at the wrist and held his pistol off and kept him from shooting again until parties arrived and took charge of Sadler.

At the first shot, fired by Sadler, old man Joe Mellwain, a good old darkey well thought of by every one, who was riding on the wagon with Sadler, fell dead with a wound in the head.

It was thought by some at first that possibly a stray bullet from Mr. Connor's pistol had killed him, but the investigation at the inquest settled the matter that it was a ball from a 22 calibre pistol which struck him, and the pistol used by Mr. Connor was r 44 calibre.

The jury found that Joe came to his death at the hands of John Sadler.

Joe is the last of three brothers Strange to say, each passed his 3 score and ten years and none died a natural death—one being killed by light-ning, one by the railroad a few years ago, and Joe in the encounter on yesterday.

A Negro Defied Arrest But Sheriff Hunter Took Him.

While in the Northeastern section of the county Friday trying to apprehend the thief who stole seed cotton from Mr. Lamp Stogner, Sheriff Hunter happened on Constable A. T. Carnes, who had warrants for Mody and Joe Thomas for disorderly conduct on the public highway, just as the constable arrested the latter. The former, standing near by in a crowd defying arrest when the sheriff walked up telling him he was the Sheriff of the county and he must submit. The negro said he would not be arrested and warned the sheriff not to approach him else he would shoot him, at the same time pointing a double barrel shot gun, which he had, toward the Sheriff. The Sheriff quickly drew his pistol and advanced on the negro, telling him if he elevated the barrel he would kill him. The negro backed a few steps with finger still on the trigger of his gun and again warned the Sheriff not to approach, but he continued to advance until getting near enough he grabbed the gun and wrenched it from the negro. Putting handcuffs on Mody he carried him to where Constable Carnes had Joe and the two were handcuffed together. The Sheriff then took a pistol from a white man from across the line which he had seen Mody give him and also took the white man's pistol which he found to be concealed on his person.

The Sheriff brought the parties on to this place and committed them to jail, and at the next term of court Mody will have to answer to resisting officers in the discharge of their duty, assault with intent to kill and carrying unlawful pistol concealed.

This is the first instance during the many years he has been Sheriff that anyone has defied arrest by Sheriff Hunter and the man should be punished to the full extent of the law. Resisting and defying an officer in the discharge of his duty is to our mind the worst form of lawlessness.

Slayer of Duvoval Acquitted.

The story of the killing of Captain William Duvoval by W. T. Eldridge some time ago was published in the Enquirer at the time. It will also be remembered that a few months back there appeared in the Enquirer a full recital of the circumstances of the Eldridge-Duvoval feud, together with a detailed account of efforts of friends of Duvoval to kill Eldridge. Although these events occurred in South Texas, they are of special interest in this locality for the reason that Capt. Duvoval was a Chester county man and leaves many relatives and friends both in York and Chester. The following dispatch of last Wednesday, from Fort Worth, Tex., gives the latest chapter of the tragedy: "Ex-Vice President and General Manager W. T. Eldridge of the Cane Belt railway was acquitted today of the charge of murdering Captain William Duvoval, leading director of the road. The trial lasted ten days. Every man who entered the court was sentenced for weapons. The verdict was justifiable homicide. A year ago Eldridge and Duvoval were mortally wounded. Two attempts have since been made to assassinate Eldridge. The last time he was shot through the body at the general office of the company. To save his life he resigned after recovering and fled. Friends of the man he killed have sworn to kill him. This was brought out in the trial."—Yorkville Enquirer.

KILLED WITH AN AXE.
