**Death Of Mr. Jerry Funderburk.**

Major Jerry Funderburk, an aged, upright, and highly respected citizen of Tradesville, in this county, died Thursday night, Dec. 1st, 1904, at the advanced age of 81 years. He had been in feeble health for some time and his death was not unexpected. He was prominent in the affairs of his section, and for years was trial justice at Tradesville. He was one of the pillars of the Baptist church there, being one of its highest and most prominent officials. Three sons and two daughters survive him, viz: J. B., and Laney Funderburk of Tradesville and P. B. Funderburk of Texas; Mrs. Samuel Laney of this County, and Mrs. Columbus Funderburk of Texas. His remains were interred yesterday at Spring Hill Baptist church.

**J. O Gregory Dies Suddenly.**

J. O. Gregory died suddenly early Thursday morning at his home at the Victoria Mill. He seemed in sound health the day before his death and both sudden and unexpected.

Mr. Gregory was a native of Lancaster County and was about fifty one years of age. He moved to Rock Hill a few years ago and had resided here continually since that time. Mr. Gregory leaves a wife and several children. Of these, two son, and a daughter were not at home when their father died.

The funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock and the body was laid to rest in Laurelwood Cemetery.—Rock Hill Record.

—Smallpox is a strange disease. When it made its appearance in this county 5 years ago colored people were the ones to be afflicted with it. For a long time no white person in the county contracted the disease. Now it is the white man's burden in this section. Out of about 100 cases in the country this fall very few colored people have had the small pox. The disease is prevalent in portions of Jackson, Sandy Ridge New Salem and Lanes Creek townships.—Monroe Enquirer.

—The family of Mr. T. P. Neil of Jackson township is an afflicted one. Five years ago Mr Neil was stricken with paralysis and has been helpless ever since. His wife died some time ago and a son and a daughter who live with him are confined to their beds with typhoid fever and there is not one in the household able to hand another a drink of water. Kind neighbors are giving the afflicted family every attention possible.—Monroe Enquirer.
