County Bonds Sold

—Messrs. Seasingood & Meyer of Cincinnati, Ohio, have purchased \$80,000 of the Lancaster county 5 per cent. bonds authorized by the Legislature to meet the payment of the old bonds which fall due Feb. 1st. This firm agreed to take the bonds at par on being paid commissions, etc., amounting to \$5,333.33. Theirs being the lowest bid, Supervisor Perry closed the deal with them. The bonds mature in 20, 30 and 40 years. The supervisor has made a very satisfactory sale.
