

Powers Granted New Trial Detrimental To Cotton Trade.

He Has Been Twice Tried For Alleged Complicity in the Assassination Of Gov. Gobel.

Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 6.—Caleb Powers former secretary of state, was today granted a new trial by the Kentucky appellate court.

Powers was charged with complicity in the assassination of Gov. Gobel. On the first trial he was convicted and given a life sentence. The second trial resulted in conviction and sentence of death.

The principle grounds assigned by Judge Parker in the main opinion granting a new trial were: Because of improper remarks made by the late attorney for the commonwealth, T. C. Campbell because sentence was passed within two days after the jury rendered its verdict, and because the court refused to grant further time to the defendant's attorneys to file reasons for a new trial.

Don't Sell Now Says W. P. Brown.

New Orleans, Dec. 5.—W. P. Brown, the great Cotton king, has issued an address over his signature to the planters, merchants and bankers of the South, in which he urges that those having cotton refuse to sell at prices at present, maintaining that the recent decline in price is unwarranted. He contends that the balance of this year's crop should bring not less than 10 cents at the ports and says that the only way to bring this price is for the farmers to hold, the merchants not to force what they have on the markets, and for the banks to stand by the merchants and not force them to sell.

He admits for the sake of argument that the crop is 12,000,000, yet he does not believe the crop will be that large, and argues that consumption will be at least 11,500,000, leaving a small quantity to go into the mill reserves. He urges all who are interested in the South and the South's prosperity to stand pat and refuse to give away cotton at prices now prevailing.

Charleston Cotton Exchange Complaints Of The Manner in Which Ginners' Reports Are Issued.

Charleston, Dec. 6.—The Charleston exchange today adopted the following resolutions and sent a copy to the chief statistician for manufacture, census bureau:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this exchange that the method adopted this year by the census bureau in issuing the report of cotton ginned in instalments instead of in sum total, as done by said bureau in previous years, has been a serious detriment to the cotton trade this season, unsettling the market values of spot cotton and creating erroneous impressions as to the final outcome of the cotton ginned. And it is further resolved that the chief statistician of the census bureau be respectfully asked and requested to issue all future reports of the cotton ginned in a monthly form in its entirety, as was his manner of doing same in the previous season.

Sequel To The Texas Tragedy.

Fort Worth, Tex., Dec. 1.—The sequel to the tragedy, that cost the lives of Stephen McKinney, his father and a hired man on their farm near Alvarado Tuesday came today. I. M. Williams, who fired the fatal shot barricaded himself in his home and defied the officers. He sent word to his daughter, the widowed bride of the man he had killed, that if she did not come to him he would kill her. In fear and trembling she went to the house. There she found her father armed with a rifle and in a frenzy of rage. The officers were afraid to fire into the house for fear of killing some member of Williams' family, whom he held prisoners there to shield him. All night the officers watched from the McKinney home, where lay the bodies of the men killed by Williams. Finally Williams seated himself by a window, his rifle across his knees, and, becoming drowsy, his head dropped on his breast and he slept. Assuring herself that her father was asleep the widowed bride stole from the house and fled to the home where, her husband's body lay. As soon as the posse learned Williams was alone they opened fire on him. He was not slow in returning it. Finally his shot ceased and the sheriff entering the house found Williams lying on the floor with a bullet through his brain.
