Lancasterians Holding Cotton.

A special to the News and Cour-
ier from Lancaster, Dec 17, says:
While it may be true, as stated in
one or more of yesterday's daily
papers, that farmers in various
parts of the State are selling their
cotton at the present low price,
contrary to the advice of the Cot-
ton Growers' Convention, such is
not the case in this locality.

Ten days ago the cotton receipts
here were about 700 bales ahead
of the receipts the same time last
year; now they are about even, so
your correspondent is informed by
the public weigher, Mr Nisbet.
Only nine bales were marketed
here yesterday, and really they
were sold some time ago, but not
delivered until yesterday.

There is probably no doubt
about the fact that there is still
considerable cotton in the country
unsold, but it is mainly in the
possession of farmers who are able
to hold it, and are unlikely to sell
until prices improve.

Dispensary Closed

The Yorkville dispensary was
closed on account of the death of
Dispenser Snider last Wednesday,
and will not be re-opened until a
new dispenser can be elected.

Under the law the board of
control cannot consider an applica-
tion for the position of dispen-
sary until the same has been in its
hands for at least twenty days.

In another column there is an
advertisement notifying all would-
be applicants for the vacant po-
sition that their applications must
be filed on or before Dec 23, and
that the board will meet on
January 13, twenty days later,
for the purpose of considering ap-
plications.—Yorkville Enquirer.
