Mrs. T. C. Hicks received a
telegram Sunday announcing the
death of her brother-in-law, Mr J.
C. Butler which occurred the eve-

of the liver. Mr Butler was an
engineer on the Seaboard and a
christian man of the highest char-
acter. His home was in Abbe-

Mackorell. His widow and one
child survives him. Mrs Hicks
went over to Abbeville on Mon-
day.

Other Deaths.
Mr W Riley Clanton, Lanca-
ster's oldest and most highly re-
spected citizens, died at the home
of his daughter, Mrs Johnson, at
this place, Dec 24, 1904. Had he
lived until March 13th, next, he
would have been 90 years of age.
He was a good citizen and a pa-
triotic man. He served his coun-
try gallantly in three wars, the
Seminoles, Mexican, and the civil.
Four children survive him, viz:
Mrs Johnson, Mrs C L Orenshaw,
W M Clanton of Haile Gold
Mine, and Newton Clanton of
Darlington. His remains were
interred christmas day in West-
side cemetery after services at the
home conducted by Rev T A Dab-
ney.

—Mrs. Margaret J. Pardue,
wife of our townsman, Mr H B
Pardue, died at their home here
Wednesday night, Dec. 21, 1904,
after an illness of only four days.
She was a daughter of the late J J
Edwards of Chester, and a sister
of Capt. W H Edwards of that
town. She was a lady of culture
and literary talent, and wrote
both prose and poetry well. She
was a contributor under a nom de
plume to the Sunny South and
other publications. She was about
56 years of age, a consistent mem-
ber of the Baptist church, and
leaves her husband and four chil-
dren surviving her, viz: W E Par-
due, Misses Minnie and Maggie
Pardue, of this place, and L H
Pardue of Atlanta, Ga. Her re-
mains were interred in Westside
cemetery Thursday afternoon af-
ter funeral services conducted in
the Baptist church by her pastor,
Rev. J H Boldridge, D. D.

daughter of the late S B., and Ma-
L. Stewman, died at 9:20 a.m.
Monday, Dec. 26, 1904, at the
home of her brother, W S Stew-
man, of this place, aged 23 years.
