An Arrest to be Made in Connection With Mr Traywick's Death.

A special to The State from Kershaw, says: "Kershaw camp, W O W, of which V. C. Traywick, who was shot and killed at Cheraw a few days ago was a member, appointed a committee consisting of Chief of police C C Bateman, Messrs W R Gregory and D A Baker, to visit Cheraw and make an investigation as to his death. As a result of their investigation a warrant has been issued for the arrest of a Mr McIntosh, who is alleged to have fired the fatal shot, charging him with criminal carelessness.

Death of Mrs Geo W Jones.

Mrs Harriet Jones, wife of Mr Geo. W. Jones, died at the home of her son, Mr R. M. Jones near Jones X Roads, January 16, 1905. She was subject to heart trouble and was seized with an attack on Friday which terminated in death at 2 p. m. Saturday. Had she lived until next May she would have been 72 years of age.

She was a most estimable lady and enjoyed the friendship and love of all who knew her. The bereaved husband and two surviving children, Mr R M Jones and Mrs M W Scarborough, have the deepest sympathy of this community in their great loss, the husband of good wife, and the children of a loving mother. Her remains were interred Sunday at Douglas church, of which she had been a consistent member for years, after funeral services conducted by her pastor, Rev J T Dendy.

Proceedings of the Cotton Growers' Convention.

The Lancaster county cotton growers' convention met at the court house at 12 o'clock, Jan. 14. The meeting was called to order by Pres. T. J. Strait. The call was read and the object of the meeting stated. The President appointed the following as committee to suggest delegates to the national convention which meets in New Orleans on Jan. 24, 25 and 26: Capt. S. E. White, Col. R. E. Allison, W. B. Plyler, C. L. McManus and D. A. Williams. The above committee recommended as delegates to New Orleans Col. Leroy Springs, C. L. McMann, W. N. Clyburn; alternates—D. A. Williams, E. B. Lingle and T. J. Strait, who were elected by the convention.

On motion of D. A. Williams the convention adopted a resolution instructing the delegates to advocate before the convention the plan of to acres to the plow and not more than 300 lbs. commercial fertilizers to the acre. Also to advocate the county ware house system to store their cotton. It was resolved further that the President be authorized to call the convention together when he thinks proper.
