Mr D E Hinson's Store Damaged by Fire

A special from Camden to The
News and Courier, March 5th,
says: Fire was discovered at 9.30
o'clock tonight in the grocery
store of D E Hinson on Broad
street. The fire department re-
sponded promptly and the flames
were soon extinguished. The
damage was principally to the
stock, which was covered by
insurance, and the damage will
not go over \$700. The store is
owned by W B Burns of Sumter.
The origin of the fire is not
known. Mr Hinson states that
he was in the building before the
hour of service to night and saw
no fire then.

Jesse B Clyburn Died in Atlanta

Mr John F Clyburn received a
telegram Monday afternoon that
his brother, Mr J B Clyburn, had
died at his father's home in At-
lanta of pneumonia. Just two
weeks ago Mr Clyburn went from
his home in Rock Hill to Atlanta
to the bedside of his mother who
was then seriously ill of pneumo-
nia. He became ill shortly after
he reached the city and, though
he had the best possible attention,
death resulted Monday.

Mr Clyburn was born near Van
Wyck, in this county, and was a
son of Mr Henry N Clyburn who
moved to Atlanta several years
ago. He was about 33 years of
age and was married about three
years ago to Miss Bright Blythe
of Waxhaw, N C., who with an
infant child survives him. He
also leaves his father, mother,
three brothers, Messrs J. S., J.
F., and H R Clyburn, and two
sisters, Mrs J M Ferguson of this
county, and Mrs J L Wilson of
Rock Hill, surviving him. He
was a member of the Methodist
church and a splendid young man,
enjoying the confidence and esteem
of all who knew him. For sev-
eral years he has occupied a very
responsible position with the
Rock Hill Buggy Co. His re-
mains were brought to Waxhaw,
N. C., yesterday, where they
were interred at 2 p m.

—Mr W E Massey, a former
Lancastrian, and his wife, sustain-
ed losses by the recent big fire in
Hot Springs, Ark., aggregating
nearly \$40,000. Mr Massey was
in the mercantile business and the
only insurance he carried was \$6,-
000. on his stock of goods. Aside
from the heavy monetary loss of
Mrs Massey by the fire, death rob-
bed the household of her father
only the day before the calamity
of the fire.
