Each county auditoris entitled to a fee of 25 cents for every transfer of real estate recorded.

Each sheriff is to receive 20 cents a day for dieting prisoners and actual expenses for himself and prisoners or lunatics when called beyond the courty. The sheriff of Lancaster receives \$150 additional for a jailor.

Each member of county boards of education shall receive \$3 for not more than seven days.

Township boards of assessors shall be paid \$2 a day per member for not more than three days, except in counties having cities of 10,000 inhabitants, where the members may receive pay for not more than 20 days. The members of the county board of equalization shall receive \$2 a day for not more than five days.
