**Shooting in Kershaw County.**  
Mr Thomas Robinson was shot twice and seriously wounded at the saw mill of Mr J R Lusk several miles from Kershaw, in Kershaw county, last Thursday morning by Mr Samuel Vincent. The balls took effect in the thigh and groin, inflicting serious wounds. Mr Robinson is foreman at the mill and the difficulty between him and Mr Vincent is said to have resulted from his having discharged Mr V. the day before. After being so seriously wounded Mr R. is said to have crawled to his home, procured his pistol and fired at Mr V. five times. None of the balls, however, took effect.
