

Hero Of Cuban Libre Fights Last Battle.

Gen. Maximo Gomez Passes Away at Habana.—Honored By Adopted Country.

Habana, June 17.—Gen. Maximo Gomez died at 6 o'clock this evening.

"El caudillo, (chieftain,) as the great leader of revolutions will be called by his countrymen expired at sunset, in the presence of his family and his old-time friend Estrada Palma, president of the republic.

The end came quietly in the beautiful temporary home at the seaside in the suburb of Vedado, to which Gen. Gomez was taken on his return from Santiago.

The distinguished patient's heart had weakened steadily since 11 o'clock in the morning and failed to respond to stimulants. Several times during his long illness Gen. Gomez had shown recuperative powers that were astonishing.

The admitions of the mass of Cubans for Gen. Gomez amounted almost to idolatry. His death admittedly is a severe blow to any political interest to which he was allied.

Gen. Gomez leaves a widow, five sons and one daughter.

Did Not Poison Wife Says The Union Jury.

Bert Gregory Cleared of Charge of Uxoricide—She Was A Bride Of Four Weeks.

Union, June 17.—In the circuit court today the case of Bert Gregory, charged with poisoning his wife, was concluded. The jury retired at 4 p. m. and returned at 8.40 o'clock with a verdict of "not guilty."

The defense made their case on the ground that poisoning was not proven by the prosecution and that the woman died of pneumonia, which she had contracted by sleeping in a draught.

The history of this case has been exploited before today and it is well known to Union people. Young "Bec" Gregory, as she was called by her relatives and intimates, was the bride of Bert Gregory, a mill operative, some 25 years old, a physical giant, but not above average mentality and possessing the phlegmatic temperament characteristic of his class in the social scale.

When Warden Faltered Prisoner Hanged Himself.

Lincoln, Neb., June 16.—Because his attorney was a day late in filing a motion for a rehearing before the Supreme Court Frank Barker was hanged here today, and the remarkable feature about the execution was that the murderer acted as his own hangman.

Barker killed his brother and his brother's wife and confessed his crime, stating he deserved the punishment which the law prescribes. The law requires that all legal hangings shall be at the penitentiary under the supervision of the warden.

As Warden Basner shrank from springing the trap, Barker informed the warden that he would perform the duty for him. An electrical contrivance which controlled the trap, connected with a wire which ran into Barker's hands. He was stopped to his hips, but had the free use of his hands and therefore was able to push the button that released the trap.
