An Advance in Cotton.

New York June 22.—The cotton market was active and excited to-day with prices advancing about \$1.50 a bale and reaching a new high point for the current year.

The closing was steady at practically the best prices at a net advance of 28 to 33 points.

Developing the Catawba.

Dr Gill Wylie Has Big Things in View for the Future.

From The Charlotte Observer.

For the last two or three months many rumors have been afloat. Sometimes they have been vague and at others almost definite, to the effect that a movement was on foot to make some large water power development on the Catawba river, south of the Catawba Power Company's plant.

The plans are now nearly perfected for the development of the water power at the Great Falls on the Catawba, near Chester and Winnsboro. At this point properties have been gotten together extending up and down the river for a distance of eight miles, controlling 173 feet fall.

The same people also own the Wateree water power, near Camden, and when the three new developments are completed at the Great Falls, then the Wateree power will be developed for 25,000 or 30,000 horse power.

This power, on the basis of 30 spindles per horse power on coarse goods, would operate 3,300,000 spindles; on a basis of 40 spindles per horse power on fine goods, it would operate 4,400,000.

Charlotte and Gastonia will make the principal points of distribution from this section, but the power will be supplied wherever it may be needed within the vicinity of Charlotte.

It has not yet been determined whether the first dam and power house will be put out to contract or built by day labor.

Wholesale Grocers Urge Use of Cotton Products.

The Association of Wholesale Grocers of the United States met in New York City June 19.

Norfolk, June 21.—A convention of Wholesale Grocers of the United States met today in Norfolk.

President, J. A. Van House, Birmingham, Ala.

First vice president, G. H. Thompson, New Orleans.

Second vice president, R. H. Woodson, Memphis.

Treasurer, S. W. Lee, Birmingham.

Advisory board, J. A. Van House, Birmingham; Theodore Melchers, Charleston, S. C.

The advisory board will elect the secretary and special representatives of the association.

The most spirited discussion of the convention was caused by the introduction of a resolution from a portion of the committee of 15 ferententials on less than earlier years.

H. B. Goodridge of Norfolk opposed the report which he said was not an expression of the entire committee.

A report was adopted urging the general use of cotton products and recommending that wholesale grocers substitute cotton bagging for jute and bagging of other materials.

The fire insurance committee was authorized to devise a plan of reorganized fire insurance, and directed to take the matter up with the board of advisers and report at the next convention.

The tobacco committee reported in favor of a 10 per cent profit to the grower.

The convention decided to meet in 1906 in April, at Jacksonville, Fla.

The president was authorized to represent the association at the Milwaukee conference of the wholesale grocers of the United States.
