

The Condition Of The Crops

An improvement in Cotton is in certain districts—The Boll Weevil in Texas.

Washington, July 18.—The weekly bulletin of the weather bureau on crop conditions says: While too rapid growth of cotton and light fruiting are very generally reported through the cotton belt, an improvement is indicated in many districts. The crop continues to suffer from lack of cultivation, especially in the central and western portions of the belt, where, however, the weather of the past week has been favorable for clearing the fields, a work which has been pursued vigorously. In Mississippi, Louisiana and Arkansas, reports of abandoned fields continue. Damage by boll weevils is not great, though considerable in localities.

Too much rain has caused injury to tobacco in Kentucky, Virginia and Maryland, where the crop has suffered from lack of cultivation, but notwithstanding these conditions the outlook in Kentucky is promising. A marked improvement is noted in Ohio, Pennsylvania and New York; the crop is doing well in New England, Indiana and Wisconsin. Curing is progressing in the Carolinas, where the yield is below the average.

Weekly Crop Bulletin

Columbia S. C., July 18. The week ending Monday, July 17th, temperature extremes were maximum of 94 degrees at Altondale on the 10th, and a minimum of 65 degrees at Greenville on the 11th and 14th. The temperature conditions were favorable. There were a number of damaging high winds, especially in Greenville and neighboring counties, accompanying thunderstorms. There was an excess of cloudiness over the entire State.

With the exception of a deficiency in the central counties where there were numerous showers but little rain, the precipitation for the week was copious and in many places excessive, ranging from one to five inches. In the extreme western, and in places in the northwestern counties lands were washed and bottom lands flooded. The rainfall was heavy along the coast and excessive in Beaufort county.

Over the greater part of the State the numerous showers and the cloudy weather kept the ground too wet to work and delayed the laying by of field crops. Some fields of corn and cotton have again become grassy and are in urgent need of cultivation.

Cotton grew very fast in all sections but did not fruit in proportion. The plants have generally attained normal growth, and in many places have grown too large, but, with the exception of Hampton county, where the rains caused the plants to turn yellow, they have a good, healthy color, but are soft and sappy. There are some complaints of shedding squares, and of black root, and of rust on sandy lands, and of damage from insects, but on the whole a general improvement is noted. The crop needs fair weather.

Some bottom land corn was damaged and some destroyed, otherwise there was a general improvement in the condition of corn, especially of late plantings. Tobacco curing is general; late tobacco made rapid growth, but the crop promises to be short. June rice receiving its first cultivation. Gardens improved. Pens doing well. Watermelons generally plentiful and shipments heavy.

Attorney McCullough Makes Vigorous Appeal to the Jury in Summey Murder Trial.

McCullough this morning in the case of the State vs. Summey, charged with the murder of Oscar Cureton. Summey is now on trial for his life. Representing the prosecution, Mr. McCullough made a hard fight for conviction, and his argument was not one of the cut and dried speeches delivered to juries. He dealt with every feature of the testimony, and spoke in no uncertain tones of the failures of juries to do their duty according to the evidence. He started in his argument that the life and property of a citizen are no more secure than the men in the jury box make them. The jury alone has the power to vindicate the majesty of the law.


