Death of Mrs. J. B. Clyburn.

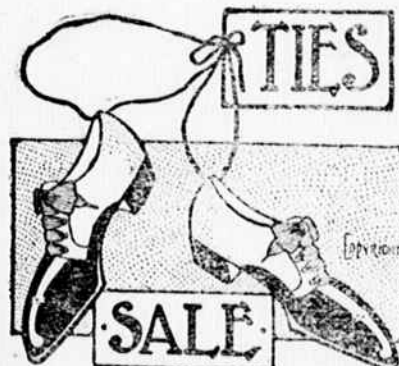
A telegram to Mr. J. F. Clyburn yesterday afternoon brought the sad news of the death of his sister-in-law, Mrs. Bright Clyburn, widow of the late J. B. Clyburn, which occurred at her home at Waxhaw of heart failure. Mrs. Clyburn was a daughter of Mr. Samuel Blythe and was about 24 years of age. She is the last of the family, her husband having died about five months ago and their only child about two months later. The interment will take place at Waxhaw at 10 a. m. today. Mr. J. F. Clyburn and family left this morning to attend the funeral and burial.
