A DISCUSSION OF WOMANLY BEAUTY.

New York Sun. The appearance here of a reigning professional beauty from London is very naturally provoking just now much discussion of the loveliness of American women as compared with that displayed by our fair visitor.

Still, Mrs. Langtry has some charms which are not common here, despite the prevalence of feminine beauty and its increasing lustre in our older communities especially. She is more graceful than the run of handsome English women, but not more so than our own.
