SEVEN DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMSHIP HIBERNIA.

THE MARKETS.

LIVERPOOL COTTON MARKET.

The Liverpool cotton market for the week ending June 16, was comparatively quiet but steady. The sales of the week amounted to 40,600 bales. The imports for the same period, 15,180 bales. The stock on hand was 657,000 bales, of which 48,800 were American.

Confidence in the National resources has been firm throughout the week. The funds have exhibited an upward tendency closing firmly on the evening of the 15th.

ENGLAND.

The steamer Canada arrived at Liverpool on Tuesday morning, the 12th. The Caledonia was spoken on Sunday afternoon the 17th and would reach Liverpool on Tuesday, 19th.

The cholera had again appeared in England, and at Paris it was making the most frightful havoc, upwards of eleven thousand deaths having been already occasioned by it, and in one day 900 new cases, and 600 deaths were reported.

The cholera is also raging fearfully in Silesia, Vienna, Petersburg, and Alexandria and Cairo, in Egypt.

The British Government repudiates all sanction of the proceedings of the French Government against Rome.

Parliament is engaged in debating the Canadian Losses Bill, and it has occasioned much excitement.

Smith O'Brien denies the legality of the action of the Government in commuting his sentence to transportation.

The potato rot has again made its appearance in Ireland.

The bill for the abrogation of the Navigation Laws has passed the House of Lords without material amendment, and has received the Royal sanction.

On Wednesday, the 13th, an insipient insurrection was detected in Paris. About 25,000 of the followers of the Mountain Party were engaged in it, headed by M. Ellège Arago, but it was promptly suppressed by the troops.

The whole number of the insurrectionists was supposed to be 70,000. Several attempts were made to erect barricades during the evening, but they were invariably frustrated by the promptitude of the military authorities.

The Assembly declared itself in permanent session, and posted a decree declaring Paris to be in a state of siege.

It is reported that the City of Rheims is in full insurrection, and that it has established a Red Republican Government.

All the Socialist and Red Republican journals in Paris have been suppressed except the "National."

EUROLOGY ON MR. POLK.—The Baltimore Sun says, George M. Dallas has been chosen, by the democratic citizens of Philadelphia, to pronounce an Eulogy on the life and character of the late ex-President of the United States, James K. Polk.

WAR OF ANNEXATION.—Battle First.—The Independent, a weekly paper published in Quebec, contains the following warlike statement:

"On Friday last, at the ordinary session of the City Council, one of the members proposed a motion, of the nature of which we are ignorant, but which another member objected to, remarking at the same time that in three months we would be Americans. Hereupon, the member who had brought forward the motion, crossed the hall, and administered a tremendous blow to his opponent, which prostrated him on the floor. The war spirit then communicated to others, and the combat threatened to become general, who put an end to the quarrel and ejected the audience."

The Shamese twins have passed through Baltimore, on their way home again, having concluded to postpone their tour of the country and visit to Europe until the cholera has passed away.

AWFUL DEMONUM.—The Cincinnati Courier, of last Friday, says:

"Yesterday, a man was laid out, after dying, as was supposed, by cholera. But while the burial service was going on, the supposed deceased came to. The consternation of the assembled company may be imagined, but it cannot be described. We understand the cause of the man's stupor was too large a quantity of cholera medicine given him containing opium. Persons should be careful, and send for a sensible physician at once."
