The Hungarians were partially defeated by the Austrians on the 21st ult., and forced to retire beyond Wagg, where, from the nature of the country, they will be able to repel the invading army. Oth-er rumors announce a victory for the Hungarians, and yet other reports an nounce that disease is raging in the Austrian

The Magyars are said to be displaying greater enthusiasm than ever. Kossuth as ordered several Austrian prisoners to work on the Railway. Ancona is said to have surrendered after a destructive bombardment, although proposals for capitulation were made on the part of the be-

sieged. The bombardment of Venice has been suspended. The advices from Pres ia and Austria are much more pacific than heretofore.

The Jewish Disabilities Bill has been rejected by the British House of Lords,
