WOVEN IRON.—We see it stated in the newspapers that Messrs. Wickersham & Walker, of Philadelphia, have a patent for the manufacture of woven iron, by which they are enabled to weave iron as large as railroad bars, or the smallest description of wire. They are now applying it to the following purposes: Iron railings of endless varieties, embracing beauty, strength, and style of finish never surpassed, for public grounds, buildings, cottages, verandahs, lawns, cemeteries, &c., iron bridges, galleries for churches, gratings for prisons, window shutters, and grating for stores, columns and cornices for cottages, tree-boxes, summer-houses, guards for decks of steamboats and vessels, &c., being cheaper than wood or cast iron.

GREAT FIRE—DONEGANA'S HOTEL IN RUINS.—On Friday morning, about half an hour after midnight, the city was alarmed by the cry of fire, and the ringing of the bells. The entire horizon appeared at the same moment to be in a blaze, to whichever side the spectator turned. On the one hand were the flames of a burning building; on the other the reflection thrown up against the sky, which was remarkably clear and starlight. On hastening into the street, it was made manifest in an instant, that the calamity had occurred to the magnificent pile known as Donegana's Hotel. At the time the writer first approached the scene of disaster, the fire could scarcely have appeared more than half an hour. But even then flames exhibited themselves throughout the whole breadth of the building on the Western side.
