Charleston special to Columbia State: There are no less than 200 places in the city where a drink of whiskey or a glass of beer can be secured, and there are at least 20 establishments where intoxicants can be had by the quart or gallon. The latter are not known to the police and probably will never be, as the houses that handle the business in this fashion sell only to the exclusive set. Chief Boyle is quoted as saying that he nor any other chief of police will never be able to enforce the dispensary law. There are those who believe that a special exception ought to be made as to Charleston in the sale of liquor because of those conditions, which are different from those of any other city in the State. Some think that the city ought to succeed from the State and make its own laws in reference to the whiskey question.

Alabama Not the Only State that has Strictly Negro Towns.

COLUMBIA, S. C., August 25.—Hobson City, Ala., where 400 negroes are about to be incorporated into a town, with no white man within the limits, is being advertised as the only one of its kind in America. This is quite a mistake. Lincolnville, S. C., about twenty-five miles from Charleston, was named after the President and has been incorporated for many years. It is more than twice the size of Hobson City, having about 1,000 inhabitants. The only white man who ever ventured to live in Lincolnville was robbed and murdered several years ago.

But as a rule the government of the town is satisfactory, the negroes are no complaints from the neighboring country. Princeton, near Tarboro, N. C., is another exclusively negro town with its own municipal government. It is peaceable and well ordered; whites do not trespass and its inhabitants do not worry the whites.

North Carolina has two white towns where no negro is allowed to rest his head. They are settled by Northerners and Westerners, but chiefly by farmers from the lake States.

The Race Problem in Georgia.

The race troubles in Georgia have assumed large proportions. In McIntosh county a deputy sheriff with a regular warrant arrested a negro named Delong, who quietly submitted, and then with a gun handed him by a woman shot the deputy dead and severely wounded another man with him. The negro fled and hundreds of his race rallied to his protection and defied the constituted authorities. The Governor called out the military, one thousand strong, and for a day or two a bloody battle seemed imminent. The negroes, to the number of about one thousand, collected in a swamp, and refused to allow Delong to be re-taken. But when the military surrounded the swamp and began to close in upon them, they became over-awed and suddenly yielded up Delong to Gen. Lawrence, the commander of the troops, who further blood-shed and what at one time promised to be the beginning of an extensive war, where happily averted.

Thinks it a Scheme.

Governor Rogers, of State of Washington, does not like the proposed anti-trust convention. Under date of August 18, he writes Governor McWeney as follows: "My Dear Sir—I regard the present attempt, by the calling of the governor's conference, to concentrate public thought upon State legislation as a remedy for the trust evil, as a very adroit attempt upon the part of the Republican managers to temporarily evade a great issue. In this scheme, it appears to me, Governor Sayers, of Texas, is being used as a cat's paw to remove Republican chestnuts from the fire. Clearly and plainly, trusts, or great corporations, will continue as long as the cause which produce them remains in full force and effect. There are: First, private control of public money or what is known as the money question. Secondly, railroad rebates and special privileges granted, or the protective tariff, or the tariff question. Fourthly, in some instances, our patent laws. No trust can exist unless based upon one of these, and each and all are absolutely and solely dependent upon national legislation. Now, to conclude that these primary and fundamental causes can be reached by State legislation is a reduction to an absurdity which I certainly hope our people will not be guilty of. It is self-evidently a very shrewd attempt to take the questions I have enumerated out of the next national campaign. Will our people be caught in this trap?"

Nine Lives Lost in Falling Arch.

CHICAGO, August 28.—Twelve steel arches each weighing thirty-three tons, which were to have supported the superstructure of the Coliseum building in course of erection on Wabash avenue, between Fifteenth and Sixteenth streets, fell to the ground late this afternoon.

It is known that nine lives were crushed out. The bodies of three men are supposed to be under the wreckage, seven are in the hospital, with injuries received in the accident, and of those two will surely die, one may possibly recover and the balance are for the greater part seriously injured.

In California there is said to be more women who are engaged in masculine occupation than in any other section in the United States.

It is at Stege, a little station about twenty miles from San Francisco, that a frog ranch is located, named after the first owner of the land roundabout. The Stege ranch extends from the bay shore up to the ridge of the Coast Range of mountains, which encloses both shores of San Francisco bay. In the lower portion of the ranch a great number of springs gush out of the soil in copious volumes. It was the spring that determined the first location of the ranch. The site, overlooking an expansive view of the beautiful bay, was capable of vast improvement. A dozen acres, including the springs, were surrounded with a hedge of cypress. The grounds were laid out with taste, and soon presented the rare beauty incident to the profuse vegetation of a semi-tropical climate. Three ponds were formed by confining the waters of the flowing springs, some acres in extent, and stocked with frogs. A fence, high enough to prevent the escape of the inmates, surrounded each, and the ponds were filled with aquatic plants and mosses. Then hundreds of frogs were placed in the ponds, and from the original stock the increase has been so great that, though thousands are sent to market yearly, the withdrawals have no sensible effect upon the vast numbers remaining. Frog ranching is not unlike cattle raising. There are one, two, three or four-year-olds, though the successful frog raiser will always keep the young ones separate and apart from the full grown, which are cannibals of the first rank, and eat all which are not able to protect themselves. The four-year-olds are considered ripe for the market, though the gourmand in frog prefers those that are a year or two younger. A frog's life is twelve years. There are some of that age at Stege. They are of monstrous growth, being fourteen inches in length and weighing as much as four pounds.

In California, as in colder climates, frogs hibernate in winter, and in the spring emerge after their long sleep enwrapped to the last degree. Then they are fed with a mixture of oatmeal and blood, and again at the spawning season, but only for a short time. They are most of the time, self-sustaining, feeding upon the insects which they cleverly catch.

Like most creatures of the animal world, frogs are capable of affection for their keeper, and demonstrate it by coming to call and allowing themselves to be handled, showing much delight in being stroked. Placed upon the ground, they readily follow their mistress for a long distance. At night the noise made by the 25 thousand frogs, which, it is estimated, are contained in three ponds, is tremendous.—Collier's Weekly.

An Immense Lumber Order.

KANSAS CITY, August 31.—An order for 500,000,000 feet of Southern yellow pine, the largest single order in the history of the lumber trade, for use in the construction of Cecil Rhodes's proposed Cape to Cairo Road, in Africa, is said to have been consummated. According to the Star twenty mills along several Texas and Louisiana railroads are under contract to fill the order. The mill owners are said to be under bond to furnish the lumber within two years.
