This is quite a mistake. Lincolnville, S. C., about twenty-five miles from Charleston, was named after the President and has been incorporated for many years. It is more than twice the size of Hobson City, having about 1,000 nhabitants. The only white man who ever ventured to live in Lincolnville was obbed and murdered several years ago. But as a rule the government of the town s satisfactory and there are no complaints from the neighboring country.

Princeton, near Tarboro, N. C., is another exclusively negro town with its own municipal government. It is peaceable and well ordered; whites do not trespass and its inhabitants do not worry the whites.


