We have passed upon all bills given us by the Solicitor and all warrants by the county offices by committee, whose reports is hereto attached, and have found the said offices well and properly kept, and the amount of money received by them properly accounted for.

We have visited by committee the poor farm and find the farm in good condition, also a fine crop of corn and wheat. The eighteen inmates, seventeen whites and one colored, and they seem to be well cared for and contented. We find that repairs have been made, as we recommended at the Spring Term of Court, as to such and covering porch.

We recommend that the action of the Clerk's office, where the public records are kept, be made fire-proof.

We recommend that E. L. Herndon be present on the subject near all our hearings, "Oconee, Her Past, Present and Future." Resolved, by the committee, that each and every candidate in the race for any County Superior, County State by Federal, office, either County State or Federal, and they are hereby urged to request not to make any subscription to any charitable object, until the approaching election shall have been held.

Resolved, That every Democratic Club in this county be urged to request to the county and elect its members to this committee, and that each club send to J. W. Shelor, secretary and treasurer of this committee, the name of the person so elected as soon as convenient; and that each of the clubs send also to the secretary of this committee the names of three persons who may be selected and appointed as managers of the primary election.

Resolved, That a committee of two persons be appointed by the County Chairman, to act as canvassers, and that the appointment of managers and the providing of tickets for the said election. The chairman appointed on the committee C. R. D. Burns and J. W. Shelor.
