Walhalla, July 8.—Editors Courier: In justice to the County Board of Commissioners I deem it my duty to reply to so nuch of Mr. Cook's article as relates to the reports of the Board, as I make up these myself. Mr. Cook says they are not made according to law. I do not know, but rather believe they are. The title of the law enacted in 1897 in reference to the reports of the Supervisor reads "quarterly" reports, and in the body of the Act it reads "monthly" re-ports. On the statute books, as I underbody of the Act it reads "monthly" reports. On the statute books, as I understand it, there are only two Acts relating to these reports, and they are published below. The law enacted in 1902 repeals all "Acts and parts of Acts inconsistent" with it and the Act passed in 1897.
