Federal Income Tax Dates.

Federal income tax officials will visit Oconee during next week for the purpose of taking income tax returns. For the convenience of the public these officials will be at the places named below on the dates given:

Walhalla, Monday and Tuesday, February 18 and 19.

Westminster, Wednesday, February 20th.

Seneca, Thursday and Friday, February 21 and 22.

The time for making these income tax returns is short, and there will be no extension of the time beyond March 1st. It is important, therefore, that all who will have to meet a Federal income tax this year meet the officials, make their returns and get necessary information.

Take advantage of this opportunity to make your returns at this time. The officials will be here for your convenience and in order to give any information desired. Consequently if you fail to send them now you will miss an opportunity to get all information and assistance that the government can give in the matter. Officials cannot be sent here or elsewhere on request. One visit is all that will be made.
