Washington, April 23.-There are 13,703,987 foreign-born white persons in the United States, as shown by the 1920 census, the Census Bureau announced Saturday night. The total foreign-born population of the United States in 1910 numbered 13,345,545. During the last decade the foreign-born population of this country has increased by only 358,442 persons, or 2.6 per cent. The

small increase is due to the almost complete cessation of immigration during the World War.

SUITS FOR A MILLION DOLLARS.

Have Been Filed in Charleston for Recovery from U. S. Government.

Columbia, April 25. --- What is thought to be the largest amount involved in any civil litigation in South Carolina is that sought in the suits brought against the United States government for determination of the purchase price of the land on which the so-called Port Terminals, at North Charleston, are located, the cases to be tried at the term of Federal Court which starts in Charleston on May 3. The Port Terminals cases, as they are called, are on the docket of the May term, this information having been received by the Federal Court officials here.

It is said that the amount involved in the litigation is more than a million dollars. The former owners of the land on which the port terminals are located are suing the government for the amount of money asked as the purchase price of the land. The government does not want to pay the price asked, alleging that this is too high.

There are four cases in this litigation, each brought by one of the owners of the land on which the terminals are located. The owners are the Filbin Company, the Charleston Farms Company, the Lockwood Co. and the Seaboard Air Line Railroad.
