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COTTON CO-OPERATIVE ASS'N.

Members Called to Meet at County Seats on Tuesday, May 23d.

Columbia, May 15.—Special: The members of the South Carolina Cotton Growers' Co-operative Association have been called by the organization committee of the association to assemble in their respective county seats on Tuesday, May 23d.

Each county convention will on that date elect delegates to a district convention, the basis for representation being one delegate for each county and one delegate for every 2,000 bales or majority fraction thereof.

At each of the district conventions to be held on Tuesday, May 30th, at the district centers which have been designated by the organization committee, two candidates will be named and following the district conventions a post card ballot will be sent every member of the association.

The State has been divided into ten districts, and ten directors are to be elected. The districts are as follows: District No. 1—Marlboro and Chesterfield counties.

District No. 2—Greenville, Pickens, Oconee and Anderson counties.

District No. 3—Spartanburg, Laurens, Union, Newberry and Cherokee counties.

District No. 4—Abbeville, Greenwood, McCormick, Edgefield, Saluda, Aiken, Barnwell and Allendale counties.

District No. 5—Darlington and Lee counties.

District No. 6—Dillon, Marion and Florence, Horry and Georgetown counties.

District No. 7—Richland, Lexington and Calhoun counties.

District No. 8—Orangeburg, Dorchester, Colleton, Bamberg, Hanppton counties.

District No. 9—Sumter, Clarendon and Williamsburg counties.

District No. 10—York, Chester, Lancaster, Fairfield and Kershaw counties.
