Something of the magnitude of the Federal prohibition officers' operations in the more densely populated centers may be gained from statements contained in a letter from R. Q. Merrick, in charge of the raiding work in South Carolina and Georgia, with headquarters in Savannah.

"I have been raising cane since I got back here Tuesday morning. On Tuesday, with my force, I destroyed 37 cases of fine whiskey, rum and champagne out at J. B. Bailey's, one of the 'Big Four' liquor dealers, the liquor being worth more than \$2,000.

CONFEDERATE GENERALS DENY

Charges Against Lincoln, Contained in Reunion Resolution.

Richmond, Va., June 23.—Abraham Lincoln was no more the instigator of the War Between the States than Jefferson Davis was responsible for the action of the Southern people.

Denials that they had voted for the resolutions censuring Lincoln, "passed in some confusion" about the time of adjournment of the veterans on Wednesday, came from the ranking officers. Gens. Carr and Howry deplored the fact that any ill-feeling should arise because there is "no necessity for any temper or ill-will or animosity to the memory of a President who felt that it was his duty to enforce the laws of the United States as he understands them."

The resolution for which Gens. Carr and Howry disclaim any responsibility were adopted Wednesday. It was embodied in a report of the "Rutherford committee," which has as its aim the elimination of any biased history text books from the Southern schools.

The report continued by stating that "sentiment has been so aroused that 'perverted Yankee histories will no longer be used to instruct our children; that the young will now be taught that the South was right, yet eternally and everlastingly right, in fighting for those principles upon which our glorious country was founded."
